Issuance and Sale of General Obligation Promissory Notes

POLICY 1.1 – Presidential Expectations – The President, in execution of his/her duties, shall not cause or allow any practice, activity, decision or organizational circumstance which is either irresponsible or in violation of commonly accepted business and professional ethics, or that results in failure to be accredited by the Higher Learning Commission.

INTERPRETATION: To avoid violation of commonly accepted business and professional ethics NTC will follow Wisconsin statute 38.16 "District Tax Levy (2) The district board may borrow money and levy taxes to be used for the purchase or construction of buildings and for additions, enlargements and improvements to buildings and for the acquisition of sites and equipment. In financing activities under this subsection, the district may issue its bonds or promissory notes under ch. 67 to pay the cost thereof."

DATA/RESULTS: The attached resolution is passed each year in order to notify taxpayers of the District's intent to borrow for capital expenditures. A notice will be published in the local newspaper informing the taxpayers of their right to petition for a referendum within 30 days. If no petition is received, the District may proceed with quotations for the borrowing.

The total capital expenditure of \$13,864,807 was approved at the March 4, 2025 board meeting. The sale of promissory notes of \$11,500,000 will include this authorization at the April 8, 2025 board meeting.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE BORROWING OF \$11,500,000; AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION PROMISSORY NOTES THEREFOR

WHEREAS, it is necessary that funds be raised by the Northcentral Technical College District, Clark, Langlade, Lincoln, Marathon, Menominee, Portage, Price, Shawano, Taylor and Waupaca Counties, Wisconsin (the "District") for the purpose of paying the cost of the District's 2025-26 Capital Budget, to wit: construction of building additions on the Wausau Campus (not to exceed \$1,500,000); remodeling and improvement projects (not to exceed \$1,500,000); building and site maintenance and repairs; site improvements; and equipment acquisition, installation and related costs (the "Project"), and there are insufficient funds on hand to pay said costs;

WHEREAS, the District hereby finds and determines that the Project is within the District's power to undertake and serves a "public purpose" as that term is defined in Section 67.04(1)(b) of the Wisconsin Statutes; and,

WHEREAS, technical college districts are authorized by the provisions of Section 67.12(12) of the Wisconsin Statutes to borrow money and to issue general obligation promissory notes for such public purposes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the District Board of the District that:

<u>Section 1. Authorization of the Notes</u>. For the purpose of paying the cost of the Project, there shall be borrowed pursuant to Section 67.12(12) of the Wisconsin Statutes, the principal sum of ELEVEN MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$11,500,000) from a purchaser to be determined by a subsequent resolution of this District Board.

<u>Section 2. Sale of the Notes</u>. To evidence such indebtedness, the Chairperson and Secretary-Treasurer are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to make, execute, issue and sell to said purchaser for, on behalf of and in the name of the District, general obligation promissory notes in the principal amount of ELEVEN MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$11,500,000) (the "Notes").

<u>Section 3. Notice to Electors.</u> Pursuant to Section 67.12(12)(e)5 of the Wisconsin Statutes, the District Secretary-Treasurer will, within ten (10) days of adoption of this Resolution, cause public notice of such adoption to be given to the electors of the District by publishing a notice in <u>The Wausau Daily Herald</u>, the official newspaper of the District. The notice to electors shall be in substantially the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u> and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 4. Prior Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the District or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.

TOPIC: 2025-26 Employee Salary/Wage Adjustments

POLICY 1.5 Compensation and Benefits – With respect to employment, compensation and benefits to employees, student workers, consultants and contract workers, the President shall maintain fiscal integrity and market competitiveness.

Accordingly, the President shall:

- 1. Annually recommend to the Board changes in the College wage and salary ranges.
- 2. Consider employees at-will unless State Statute or the College determines that individual employment contracts are required or beneficial.
- 3. Provide competitiveness through strategies that consider the labor markets in which the College competes for talent.
- 4. Attract and retain outstanding employees critical to the delivery of the College's mission.
- 5. Recommend budget adjustments necessary to fund employment or pay modifications.
- 6. Maintain a competitive benefit package to attract and retain qualified talent.
- 7. Abide and comply with all applicable employment-related state and federal regulations.

Wisconsin Statute 38.12 (3) requires the District Board to approve compensation of District employees.

INTERPRETATION: The Board must authorize wage and salary adjustments for employees.

DATA/RESULTS:

Board authorization is requested to implement July 1, 2025 salary/wage adjustments for employees. The proposed adjustments are aligned with the 2025-26 fiscal planning parameters presented to the Board and do not deviate materially from the geographical or professional market for the skills employed.

For Non-Represented staff, the following is proposed for 2025-26 and includes:

- 4% adjustment to the overall structure of the pay plan;
- 4% increase to the control point of the grade added to the base wage as a flat dollar amount

Agenda Item 1: Welcome & Introductions

Brooke Schindler, Dean of School of General Studies & Business at Northcentral Technical College, welcomed everyone to the meeting and thanked them for attending.

Everyone in attendance introduced themselves.

Agenda Item 2: Update & Highlights from Last Meeting

The group was given a few minutes to review the minutes from the previous meeting. The minutes were approved by all.





Agenda Item 3: College-Wide Initiatives

Brooke Schindler – Dean of General Studies & Business presented the following College-Wide Initiative Power Point to the Advisory Committee.



Agenda Item 4: Instructional Area/Program

A. Industry Trends

- Gail's email update: The Joseph Project recently held a session with 13 graduates, 8 of whom
 were hired. With Wisconsin's unemployment rates at historical lows, the job market is highly
 competitive. Employers are becoming more selective prioritizing specific skills and experience
 over a larger pool of applicants. As a result, they are focusing less on perks and more on finding
 candidates who meet their exact hiring criteria.
- Ray: Staffing issues have been improving and are now stabilizing. The ladies' group was most negatively impact, in that staffing issues prevented classes from meeting. Efforts are being made to improve this. Attendance and participation remain high, with strong interest in the classes. There has also been more stability in the inmate population, possibly due to the hiring of additional personnel, reducing transfers.
- Tina: The department has seen some new faces and transfers, including a new supervisor in the office and one moving to the juvenile division. Employment is positive, but housing remains a challenge. However, the Joseph Project and the Community Partners Campus have been very helpful in addressing this issue.
- Ronda: Programming is progressing well and is nearly back to pre-COVID levels. Additional addiction and substance use programs have been introduced through a state grant. A plan will be developed with Ray Slatton to ensure smooth coordination between the programs.
- Kevin: In the past, specialty Welding Programs were offered to jail students, and there's interest in finding similar programs for inmates with a high school diploma or HSED to help them use their time productively. Offering skill-building programs would be beneficial. Additionally, there has been a significant decrease in the number of repeat offenders from Marathon County, possibly due to the drug addiction courses and materials provided to inmates.

B. Program Information

1. Jail FTEs



NTC AE Faculty provided an update on how things are going at each jail sites.

2. Grants Update for FY2024

NTC is in the final year of the Fiscal Year 2021-2025 grants and is in the process of re-applying for the same grants for the upcoming fiscal years. NTC's Adult Education will be applying for the Comprehensive and Re-entry grants, which support a lot of the Adult Education programming, including those at campus sites, the ELL program, and in jails.

C. Curriculum/Assessment

1. 2023 - 2024 Jail Summaries

There is a summary for each jail for the 2023-2024 school year. They are one page in length which includes the number of students that were served, the areas in which they were working (College and Career Readiness Standards (CCRS) curriculum, self-improvement, GED, or HSED). These reports were inspired by conversations we have had in the past with MCJ regarding how many students there were, how many have a credential or not, and whether we need to adjust the programming.

In the summaries, the students' academic successes are highlighted as a bar graph at the bottom, which illustrates: passing GED tests, getting a higher level on a test (an academic gain), completing an employability or financial literacy course. This shows how they are doing with the programming they are receiving. Are they making any gains? Is the instruction leading to any change? There is also a bulleted list of the same information. If the reviewer prefers the material in a narrative format.

There are a couple of reasons we provide these reports to you. One reason is so you can see how it went last year. Another reason is that it can be a tool for you to use in conversations with your superiors or administrators that may have questions about what they are getting for the money spent because these come through service agreements. We hope this provides some good data to share.

You can also look at the reports for other jails to view what they are doing. Perhaps you see that a different jail has more going on in a particular area, and you want to learn more. How did they accomplish that? How is it helping their students? With this information, we're also hoping to connect you with the other jails. We are willing to be the conduit for that and can answer your questions as well, but we are hoping it will inspire some conversation, collaboration, and some potential expansion of the programming, or at least a switch to a different focus for you.

2. Instructor Report

- Barb: This semester at Marathon County Jail is going smoothly, with 61 students currently
 enrolled in the Adult Education program. Of these, 16 are in GED/HSED classes, and 4 have
 already completed courses on Canvas. There are also 2 incarcerated youths. GED testing is
 not currently available due to the HSED program taking over. All self-improvement students
 are working on WRC foundation classes and drug addiction packets.
- Kellie: At Taylor County Jail, there are currently 9 students. Some are working on WRC, one
 is studying computer science, and there has been a recent graduate. Drug addiction packets
 have been distributed, with about 21 students submitting completed ones. The current
 focus is on mental health and drug addiction, and efforts are underway to provide additional
 packets.



- Kay: At Price County Jail, there are 8 students currently enrolled. Three are working towards
 their HSED, while the other five are focused on Self-Improvement courses. Several students
 have earned certificates through drug addiction packets, which they enjoy. Additionally,
 some students have worked on employability skills, including creating resumes, cover
 letters, and learning job search techniques. The program looks forward to continued success
 with the students.
- Wendy: Things have been quiet at Langlade and Lincoln County Jails. A few students are
 working on their HSED, and some are focused on WRC. Gail Hurd will visit both jails to
 discuss the services they offer. In the spring, online skills classes will be available for
 inmates, focusing on listening, communication, and interviewing skills.

D. Focus Discussion Item: Burlington English access for Justice Involved ELL Students

Kathy Krause – AE Program Director, GED/HSED Advisory, AE Faculty discussed that the Burlington English software, used by NTC's ELL students to learn English, has been approved for use by jail students whose first language is not English.

• Welcome and Introductions- Chair

Greg Cisewski welcomed everyone and led introductions. There were no corrections made to the last meeting minutes.

Industry Discussion

Pam Walker stated she closed ColdSnap Aquaponics. Walker Cranberry is applying chemicals via drones as applications are more timely and accurate.

Hsu Growing supply is having a good year for ginseng. The company is worried about tariffs, but currently is ahead of the threat. There is currently a partnership with Recycling Connects and the Village of Weston for a grant from the USDA to collect foods waste.

Janell stated she works with consumers and sees an increase in agricultural inquiries by 315%. Janell and Trevor to meet regarding adding the State-Wide Outreach Specialist for Green Industry to the Advisory Committee. There is a potential trend for an increase in gardening.

Red Door Family Farm has heard about an employee shortage from other employers, but they are not having that same issue. The company has added multiple new positions since opening seven years ago. They currently are employing a graduate from the first cohort of the Garden to Market Program. Grant writing and business management are extremely important skills to have when trying to be a small-scale successful farm.

Monk Botanical Gardens has had an unaffected number of out of area visitors since the attempted name change. They have lost their executive director, program director, and part-time media position. The walking paths have been redone to meet ADA standards. Trevor's Designing and Timing Your Garden class is working on the kitchen design. There are four new board members that recently started. Sheila mentioned her term on the board will be ending in June 2025, but she will still stay involved. The new executive director should be on-boarded by the end of the year.

Advisory Committee Meeting Minutes

Garden to Market

Industry members had a large interest in the drone courses being offered for the agronomy program.

The Master Gardener's have established a new scholarship at Northcentral Technical College specific for the Garden to Market Specialist Program, which consists of two \$1,000 scholarships. The first applicant has been awarded this fall. The Master Gardener's Vision will be hosted at NTC on January 18th, with registration opening December 1st.

Land Art Inc, had a very long season as they were able to start early with last years mild winter. The company has purchased an additional mini excavator as well as hiring new crew members to assist with the heavy workload. A fence was installed around the pond due to insurance reasons as well as a barn built, with a sod roof, holding chickens, ducks, horses and goats for internal viewing. The greenhouse has moved towards the back of the property. Currently, they are booked out until July 2025.

Program and Curriculum Discussion

The Agronomy Program has been awarded a Wisconsin Technical College System (WTCS) grant for \$298, 764. This grant will allow for faculty to re-construct the program with a higher precision agriculture focus. Examples of this include the use of drones for field applications and maintenance.

The Garden to Market Specialist Program has 7 first year students. The Developing Markets Grant for this program has ended in June, but the program does have additional grants such as the Community College Alliance for Agriculture Advancement (C2A3) and Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) Partnership Grants. These help fund soil sampling, student workers, conservation efforts, and test plots.

Northcentral Technical College and NRCS have an agreement for an additional High Tunnel to be purchased and construction training to be provided to NRCS Staff. Trevor is in search of a company who could construct the high tunnel while the training is being conducted. Currently, NTC has a high tunnel which includes 3 raised beds and robots installed for weeding and watering.

The School of Agricultural Sciences is undergoing Agriculture 4.0. Trevor has requested the following to follow this initiative: aquaponics system, a headhouse for the greenhouse, electric tractor and charging station (this would be shared with the Agronomy Program) and a BCS tiller. A Tilmore Electric 520 has also been requested. NTC is currently working with Tilmore to potentially become a demonstration site for the electric version. Trevor asked industry for suggested implements and attachments that should be purchased with this cultivating tractor.

The Garden to Market students assisted with relocating the standard orchard and installing the new high density orchard at the farm. The relocation was due to the new roundabout that was put in on Highway K. Additional landscape projects around the new sidewalk after the addition of the Student Engagement Center Vestibule, greenhouse, and growpod will be happening soon. Continuing the development of the All-American Selections Garden and USDA People's Garden will continue to happen. The NRCS weather station has been relocated to be closer to the Student Engagement Center. There is a possible relocation going to be happening with the NRCS/Pheasants Forever Pollinator Plot.

NRCS has a large focus on rural development with lots of grants being offered. Due to the importance of grant writing, students are introduced to the process of grant writing and grant applications in the Business Management course. Sharon Ruff to look into offering a grant writing course through Workforce Training and Professional Development.

Update and Highlights from Last Meeting

Meeting called to order by Bryson Cruise, at 12:01 pm. Bryson asked for any changes to the from the fall 11.12.24 meeting minutes. These minutes were emailed out with the meeting reminder and agenda for today's meeting. No changes were suggested to those minutes. Motion was made by Bob Pound to approve the fall meeting minutes; the motion was seconded by Corey Smith. Motion carried.

Community Safety Simulation Center (CSSC) Update

Dean Angela Roesler discussed the CSSC and gave the group an update on the project. Community Safety Simulation Center ("CSSC") is formerly known by the community as River's Edge Gifts (1505 Champagne Street, Merrill, WI). Community need brought forward by community partner Church Mutual Ins. to seek solutions by the exploration of a partnership with PSBA (Pennsylvania School Boards Association), and their safety institute, PennSSI (Pennsylvania School Safety Institute) of Mechanicsburg, PA

- Partnering with PSBA/PennSSI in developing a national model The first in the nation!
- PennSSI to share their developed customized content for K12 & Law Enforcement audiences
- Collaboration with NTC resources/Students in the Video Production Program The Center's technology will include:

 - Virtual Reality (VR) VR immerses the user in a simulated environment

- B. What is Youth Apprenticeship

- Completes competencies from one of the On-The-Job Learning (OJL) Performance Guides, which are career specific and industry driven.

Program Updates

Bryson Cruise, Fire and EMS Manager for NTC, gave the following program updates to the group:

- Live Fire Instructor
 - Live fire instructor course has been approved by IFSAC and went live in the WTCS portal on January 15th. 24 hours of instruction. Train – the – Trainer meetings 1/15/2025
- Firefighter 1/Hazardous Materials Updates
 - Firefighter 1/Hazmat updates are required by IFSAC, trying to roll both out by the end of July to continue to use one single book for the firefighter 1 class and hazmat ops class.
- Live Fire Instructor In Charge
 - In Process- Live Fire Instructor in Charge has taken a back seat to the fire 1 and hazmat classes due to the time restrictions
- National Wildlife Coordinating Group classes
 - We are currently looking into feasibility- we had an introductory meeting with Nicholas Hovda, DNR Forestry Ranger from the Wausau DNR Office. This was brought up in conversation many years ago about offering wildland firefighting classes at NTC. UWSP (DNR Program) and Fox Valley (Wildland Program) are the only other colleges offering this type of training. This would be approximately 52 hours, as a separate standalone program.


- There was interest from the group on how the DNR would want to handle this and Bryson suggested this conversation has not yet been had.
 - What is the benefit for departments if they are not specifically looking to get into Wildfires.
 - Would the end goal to be to get Red Card certified (Type 1)?
 - If you are already going ¾ of the way there doing 130 and 190, why not go all of the way?
- Recommendation from the Advisory Committee: Phillip Rentmeester made a motion for the program to pursue this opportunity to bring the National Wildlife Coordinating Group classes to NTC, Scott Gomoll seconded the motion.
- Splash Tower Update- Rob Elliott
 - Splash Towers went up, knowing they would not last forever
 - Outdoor, wood structures (15-20-year estimate for how long they would last)
 - A few years ago, NTC started budgeting for replacement
 - Estimate \$150,000-175,00 each for replacement
 - Due to Phillips splash tower safety concerns, an engineer was brought on site to evaluate the tower
 - Weston tower came down
 - Medford asked for the land back and the land was sold back
 - o Phillips Splash Tower Engineer's Report: Rob Elliott gave a summary of the report from the engineer. The engineer's assessment indicates the tower is in 'fair' condition and that the splash tower could remain functional for the next 3 to 5 years with some maintenance, however, over the next 3 to 5 years many of the items noted in the report will continue to degrade, compromising the structural integrity of the tower. Rob shared that he believes we can engage a contractor for repairs, with an estimated cost of just under \$30,000. This investment will ensure the tower remains safe for local fire departments to use for the next 3-5 years, along with regular monitoring for any additional concerns. This tower is extremely high which creates some serious safety concerns when in perfect condition, which is why these safety concerns should not be left unaddressed. Rob spoke with the VP that covers risk management at NTC who recommended that we obtain an evaluation by our insurance company to determine if they will continue insuring the tower in its current condition along with the completion of the necessary safety repairs.

Questions from group:

- 1. When we have a department come onto our property to use the Splash Tower, what are our requirements for what training they need to have in order to come on site?
- 2. How many fire districts are served out of Phillips?
 Bryson said probably 15-20 departments and it is likely their only option other than coming down here to NTC. Who is using it, when and how they are using it, in addition to knowing what training they have prior to coming on site. We need this tracking.


FY 2025-2026 Capital & Operational Budget

- 1. Questions get jumbled so people sitting next to each other do not have the same questions in the same order
- 2. What are they struggling with?
 - a. Regimented Curriculum- students say that the PPT alone will not allow them to pass; must also read the book
 - b. Bryson mentioned maybe adding some resources to the Canvas shell, like on how to study or test taking, etc.
 - c. Chris Munson asked about practice tests, so maybe that is something that could be added to the Canvas shell. She suggested this Quizlet, for example, for the Firefighter 1 Test https://quizlet.com/581521425/firefighter-1-final-test-firefighter-1-fire-1-test-prep-flash-cards/
 - d. Ward Lyon mentioned other possibilities for ACADIS (navigate premier access- great resource). Many more ways to analyze data are available with ACADIS. Fire coordinators can see missed JPR reports.
 - e. Don't sign the student up again right away-give that student time to study more-signing them up again right away does them a disservice without having them study more before re-testing, as most often it is another fail right away

Halan, a student in UW-Whitewater's College of Education and Professional Studies, is serving as a student teacher in the business and marketing education programs at Marshfield High School in the Marshfield school district(s) through the end of the school year.

"Our students are highly sought after," said Fred Trotter, administrative director in UW-Whitewater's Office of Clinical Experiences. "School districts really appreciate the caliber of our graduates."

A total of 169 UW-Whitewater students were placed in school districts around the region starting in January. Student teaching is the final activity before teacher candidates earn their degree and license.

UW-Whitewater will partner with 220 cooperating teachers across 104 schools in 65 districts over the course of the semester.

"We couldn't do this without a lot of the great partnerships we have with those pre-K through 12 schools—their partnerships are very much appreciated," Trotter said.

Student teachers assist cooperating teachers with lesson planning, instruction and assessment. This spring, 35 UW-Whitewater teacher candidates were hired by school districts as student teaching interns as part of the Department of Public Instruction's (DPI) Wisconsin Improvement Program. Interns are licensed by the DPI to teach up to 50% of each day on their own and receive a stipend for the semester.

UW-Whitewater licenses the most teachers in the state

of Wisconsin. Educating teachers was the university's original mission during its founding in 1868.

CMN celebrates Indigenous Education at third annual Round Dance celebration

The booming beats of hand drums and the high-pitched tones of Indigenous singers, drummers, and dancers filled the Five Clans Ballroom at the Menominee Casino Resort.

On Saturday, March 1, the College of Menominee Nation hosted the third annual Honoring Indigenous Education Round Dance at the MCR in Keshena.

This is the third CMN Round Dance celebration and student organizers said it has been growing with each year.

"This event was initially started by Sophie Teller and Betsy Trudeau, they were talking with Kelli Chelberg about doing some drum making, ribbon skirt making, and a small, community round dance that was going to held at the Cultural Center on the CMN

campus," CMN Education student, Chenoa Webster said.

"At first, we didn't know what to expect. We ended up counting over 500 people coming to the event. The second year, we had about 750 or more. Each year it seems like it's growing bigger. It's amazing to see the community come together each year.

The Round Dance celebration included a number of hand drum singing and dance competitions and specials. Event organizers said the event is becoming more popular and had grown with each successive year.

More and more people from different communities come to celebrate too. I think that shows how this event has grown and how big an impact Indigenous education has on our communities and those that surround us."

Webster, an Oneida tribal member, is on the Education Round Dance planning team and is in her senior year at CMN in the college's teacher education program and wants to teach middle school-age

After she finished high school, Webster said she attended a state college but felt overwhelmed and she did not perform well.

"I felt like I got lost in the numbers. Coming out of high school, it wasn't what I was hoping for and I didn't do well. I had to put my education plans to the side but I decided to go back during the pandemic so I came to CMN. Once I started here I realized this is exactly the type of education I was searching for. I felt included, it's culturally responsive teaching, it's including our Indigenous ways and ways of knowing. I think now more than ever it's important to keep developing Indigenous education, keep promoting who we are as a people and being able to represent

who we are within education systems."

Webster added that she did not have any favorite teachers when she was a young student. She said she often found herself to be one of a few Indigenous students at her school.

"That's another reason why I wanted to become a teacher, to be that role model for students. Representation matters and for Indigenous students being able to have an Indigenous teacher, someone who looks familiar, someone who deals with some of the same issues, that can have a big impact on students. I think we're able to connect more and bring in those cultural teachings to make everything relevant to the students in class. When you don't have someone, you can see yourself in, you might not feel connected to what you're supposed to learning."

Schulylar Davids, a fifthgeneration teacher, is preparing to graduate from CMN this spring from the education program and is looking forward to teaching middle school students. An enrolled member of the Stockbridge-Munsee Tribe, Davids said she was never introduced to Native culture until she started attending CMN.

"I think it's important to give students their identities. Some students who might not know their Native identities, that's why places like CMN and Indigenous education in general is so important."

The Round Dance was an evening-long affair, beginning at 5 pm and going until midnight and featured adult and youth hand drum competitions and several dance specials

CMN President, Dr. Christopher Caldwell, welcomed the community and thanked everyone for their support of Indigenous education.

Caldwell remembered back to the first CMN round dance three years ago right after the COVID pandemic and said he feels proud of the support the round dance, and Indigenous education, has received from the Menominee and surrounding communities.

"When we had our first Indigenous education round dance three years ago, that was the first largest gathering we had after the pandemic. It demonstrated the strength we have as tribal communities. It makes my heart feel good seeing everyone here tonight."

Adorned in a traditional ribbon

skirt, Oneida tribal member, Christine Munson, came back to the Menominee community to take part in the celebration.

Munson was an environmental sciences teacher at CMN from 1998 through 1999. She is currently an advisor at the fechnical College.

"We all know that being Indigenous means that we have knowledge and responsibilities and when we are able to have ownership in what information is shared, how that information is shared, it is so much more meaningful and fulfilling the purpose of connecting our communities and ensuring that our future generations are blessed with the amazing wisdom our elders have passed on to us," Munson said.

"Education and knowledge is for everybody. In order to feel comfortable and safe so that the most learning can happen, it's so helpful when we see ourselves represented in all levels of education. Whether its teachers, principals, administrators; the more Indigenous people we see in professional realms, the more we see ourselves and the dreams we had as youths come true."

Four running for three seats on Abby SB

Four candidates, including three incumbents and a challenger, are running for three seats on the Abbotsford School Board on April 1. The top three vote recipients will earn three-year terms on the board.

Candidates include current board members Sharon Archambo, Nathan Jakel and Gary Schraufnagel, along with challenger Frankie Soto

Frankie Soto.

Soto was the district's food service director for 27 years and is now semi-retired and working in the Thorp and Medford school districts. Soto's two daughters graduated from Abbotsford High School, and two of his grandchildren are open-enrolled from Colby into Abbotsford. He previously served three years on the Abbotsford City Council and is a member of the church council at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Curtiss.

Jakel was appointed to fill a vacant seat on the board in November. He previously served on the committee that explored consolidation with Colby and is currently the president of the Abby Heat youth softball/baseball board. He is a master plumber at Jakel Plumbing, and two of his three daughter are in the district (a kindergartener and second grader). His youngest is two years old.

Archambo has served on the board for the past five years and is also a member of the Abbotsford Library Board of Trustees and the city's planning commission. She also an election poll worker, a volunteer at Abbotsford Elementary and a lector at St. Bernard's Catholic Church. Archambo was a special education teacher's assistant for 28 years, working with students with Autism spectrum disorder. All six of her children and nine of her grandchildren have graduated from Abbotsford High

Schraufnagel has served on the board for four terms, a total of 12 years, and previously sat on the board for the Abby Heat program. He is vice president and ag lender at Forward Bank in Colby, and all four of his kids have graduated from Abbotsford.

The candidates were each asked the same four questions; their answers are below:

Why are you running for the Ab-

botsford School Board?

Soto: "I'm looking at changes and new ideas. I want my own grandchildren to have the same thing that my children had here. I think they're lacking some communication between management and staff."

Jakel: "I grew up in Abbotsford, graduated from Abbotsford High School and I take a lot of pride in the school. I would like to see it continuing on the path it is on. They have a great board right now, and it's a team I've been looking for an opportunity to join."

Archambo: "Supporting education endeavors for our youth is my passion. I throrughly enjoy involvement with our youth. I attend many music and athletic activities, as well as those honoring our students. I've participated in the Walk to School and attend other school gatherings."

"I say school plays a vital role in fostering a quality education, but it fostering a quality education, but it aleath of our children. Working together, we can equip children with the knowledge and integrity so they can succeed as productive, caring and happy citizens, because students today are our leaders to-

Schraufnagel: With the passage of another referendum last year, Shraufnagel said he'd like to see that project through to its completion. 'I originally got on just because I thought it would be good to know the financial workings of a school district. I understand how businesses run, but public entities are a little different."

What would you say makes you the best candidate for the job?

Soto: "I've been in the School District of Abbotsford for 27 years. I know the school district. I've



seen good things in the school district. My kids and grandkids have attended and are attending now, and I feel the district deserves a well-deserved pat on the back. For such a small school, they are doing quite well, and I feel like they do things like a bigger school does."

Jakei: "With three young daughters, I have a pretty vested interest in the school. I just want to see what's best for all students and staff in that building."

Archambo: "Trying to do what

Archambo: "Trying to do what you can for the success of every student is a priority. Having worked in the school system, I understand the needs of the students."

Schraufnagel: "I have a good financial background. I bring that to the table when reviewing schools finances. Our existing school board is a good team, and I think a lot of us bring different viewpoints. It kind of makes it a more well-rounded team to work with."

What would you say are the district's biggest challenges right now and how do you think the board should address them?

Soto: "I think our biggest challenge is going to be keeping the enrollment at the pace it is now. Also, with the federal government changing, they don't want to have the Department of Education at the federal level, but hand it off to the state level."

Soto said he wants to make sure that "every school district in Wisconsin gets a fair share of money if a change happens," and if Congress takes action to eliminate the Department of Education, he wants to make sure the district stays up-to-date with the changes.

Jakel: "I think the biggest challenge right now is the incoming demographics that are constantly

Archambo: "We need to encourage more parental involvement. With a diverse population, meeting the needs of all I feel is a challenge. Currently, many opportunities are presented, including a recent math family night and Read Across America. The elementary also extended parent-teacher conferences to better accommodate parents. Through NTC, adult English classes will begin in April."

"I feel the success of every student is a priority. My ear is always open to the community and the school. I will listen and learn of concerns and be pleased with positive feedback."

Schraufnagel: "I would say the biggest challenges are the biggest opportunities we have as well: a diverse student population and a growing student population. Increased enrollment provides more funding, but the district has also had to keep adding classrooms the last 10 years, he said.

"We have strong dual language staff, and we have some longtime teachers," he added.

What do you think about federal directives to eliminate the U.S. Department of Education and eliminate DEI programs in all schools?

Soto: "At this point in time, I feel that our federal government is headed down the wrong aisle. We are teaching our kids for the years to come. I feel that this is not going to be the right way to do it. Hopefully, Congress steps in."

Jaket: "My only comment on

Jakel: "My only comment on that is that I'm in support of having decision-making at the local level.

Nobody knows the kids in our schools better than those who walk the halls every day. I'm in support of as much local decision-making as possible."

Archambo: "As far as DEI programs, I feel equity is fairness, and every school should try to be fair. There's just so much that's out there, and then it's rescinded. It's kind of wait and see what's going to happen. We have an extraordinary administrator who thoroughly researches this and provides input to the board."

"I'm heartened that the commutive has stepped up to meet the distirt needs in passing two referendums. We have new classrooms and the FEMA building, and in the spring, we will be adding additional classes and upgrades to increase safety. The new school forest is phenomenal"

est is phenomenal."

Schraufnagel: He said he doesn't know enough about what's happening on the federal level to comment, but he remains focused on state-level education policy.

"Tm looking more at funding for public schools." He said he's opposed to taking money from public schools and using it to pay for private ones, and he wants to protect state funding for public education.

When it comes to the U.S. Department of Education, he said the impacts of the agency are not something he sees much. "I see more or less what happens to us on the state level."

"With DEI, I guess there's levels of confusion with the Title IV stuff that came out. When you start looking at the legal representation we get and how that goes against some of the executive orders that have come down, it just gets to more of a wait-and-see attitude I guess."

Wisconsin Launches Its First Dental Therapy Educational Program

Northcentral Technical College in Wausau is launching Wisconsin's inaugural dental therapy program to combat the scarcity of dental professionals in rural regions. This initiative aims to enhance access to essential dental services by training mid-level practitioners.

In response to the pressing need for dental care in underserved rural areas, Northcentral Technical College (NTC) in Wausau is set to offer Wisconsin's first dental therapy degree program. Dental therapists are mid-level practitioners trained to perform routine procedures such as cavity fillings and simple extractions, thereby expanding access to essential dental services.

The establishment of this program follows the state's approval of dental therapy licensure in January 2025, a legislative move designed to mitigate the shortage of dental professionals in rural communities. NTC has secured \$2.2 million in state grants to develop the necessary infrastructure, including a new classroom equipped with 12 high-definition simulators to provide advanced training for students.

The program aims to enroll 12 students each fall, primarily recruiting from within the NTC district, with plans to expand outreach statewide if necessary. The curriculum is designed to equip dental therapists with competencies in approximately 95 procedures, focusing on restorative care. The implementation of dental therapists allows dentists to focus on more complex procedures, thus improving patient access to timely care.

The introduction of dental therapists is anticipated to enhance the efficiency of dental practices, particularly in areas where recruiting dentists has been challenging. By integrating dental therapists into the healthcare system, Wisconsin aims to provide more equitable oral health care, ensuring that even uninsured or underinsured patients receive necessary treatments.

As the program progresses, efforts will be made to educate both the public and dental professionals about the role of dental therapists, fostering acceptance and collaboration within the dental community. This initiative represents a significant step toward addressing oral health disparities and improving the overall quality of life for residents in Wisconsin's rural areas. Click here to read more. Northcentral Technical College to offer dental therapy program, first in Wisconsin

WAUSAU, Wis. (WJFW) — Finding a dentist in Wisconsin has become a difficult task, particularly in rural areas. Many rural areas are facing dental care shortages, and adults struggle to find providers that accept Medicaid.

Northcentral Technical College will soon be offering a new dental therapy program, the first of its kind in Wisconsin.

With the new expanded clinic, students will get a hands-on approach when learning new skills.

In January 2024, lawmakers signed a bill approving \$20 million in funding to go towards dental therapy programs in state technical colleges, including NTC.

"We're really excited to enhance the dental care in the community.," said Laura Ahonen, Associate Dean of Allied Health And Human Services.

Since receiving the news, Ahonen and her team have been planning out academic programming and expanding their classrooms.

A dental therapist is a mid-level provider, similar to a physician's assistant, who works closely with dentists.

"A dentist is trained in about 400 procedures," Ahonen said. "A dental therapist is trained in about 100 of those procedures. But, the procedures they do know, they are trained to that same level as a dentist." Future students will waste no time and work directly out of NTC Community Dental Clinic, practicing their skills on real patients.

"They will start working on real patients right away their first semester," Ahonen said. "It's important to develop those skills. How to interact with a patient. We can only do so much on a simulator. We need real patients and real mouths and real teeth to hone our skills."

Dental therapy students will be able to perform procedures like cavity fillings and simple teeth extractions for community members.

"Having a dental therapy program, we will be able to provide dental care while students are in the program," Ahonen said. "And we think about the reach beyond that. Once we have graduates, the reach those therapists can provide." To be eligible for the program, students must have obtained their dental hygiene degree from an accredited program. Only 12 students will be accepted.

The program is awaiting accreditation from Commission on Dental Accreditation, but Ahonen expects the program to begin in 2026.

Wausau fire department seeks land for burn tower training facility

WAUSAU, Wis. (WSAW) - Wausau firefighters may soon have a new training tool to prepare for real-world emergencies. Fire Chief Jeremy Kopp is asking the Infrastructure and Facilities Committee of the City of Wausau for land to build a burn tower—a specialized facility that allows firefighters to train under controlled conditions.

"When it comes to responding to emergencies, we're always going to want to train," Kopp said. "We're always going to want to make sure that we are providing the best services."

A burn tower simulates fire conditions in a safe environment, helping firefighters reduce the risk of injury, improve efficiency and build confidence. It would be the only one in Marathon Co.

Before construction can begin, the city must approve a location and the request for city property to go to the fire department. Kopp said no specific site has been selected yet, but the land must meet certain criteria.

"It needs to be something that's readily accessible, probably from some pretty big roads or main roads, or maybe even the highway," he said.

Ideally, the site would cover at least two acres to comply with international fire safety training standards. Kopp also said the project aligns with his broader goal of improving Wausau's fire preparedness rating.

"It's also one of my goals as the fire chief in Wausau to get our ISO rating to one," he said. "The Wausau area has never been to an ISO one rating."

A location near Northcentral Technical College would be beneficial, Kopp said, since the college will collaborate with the fire department on the project.

"We partner with NTC on a lot of different things when it comes to fire and EMS, and this is just one more opportunity for us to partner together," he said.

The amount the department and NTC will each pay has not been decided yet.

"Maybe a fifty-fifty partnership moving forward and determining all the costs that go into it and how far we each want to go," Kopp said. "I couldn't speak to those details very well at the moment until we get a little further."

There is no firm timeline for the project yet. Kopp is currently evaluating city-owned properties that meet the necessary requirements and plans to present options to the Infrastructure and Facilities Committee of the City of Wausau on April 10.

Witt-Birn School Board approves latest ACP

High school seeing more student interest in developing career plans By: Lee Pulaski, *City Editor*

The Wittenberg-Birnamwood School Board approved an updated academic career plan (ACP) Feb. 17 designed to help make sure more students are ready to launch into careers through college, trade schools or directly out of high school.

All school districts are required to have such plans implemented to aid students in making career plans, something that district officials say is making a difference.

"Over this year and last, we've been really diligent about creating space during the school day," said Superintendent Garrett Rogowski. "About an hour of our day is spent working on academic and career planning."

The plan was crafted by Megan Rothmeyer, principal of Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School, who pointed out that early intervention is the key to making sure the younger generations are prepared to make a living.

According to Rothmeyer, the hour dedicated to ACP includes utilizing Xello, a program that helps students investigate various careers and learn what they might be interested in pursuing once their high school education is complete. The time is also focused on Method Learning, a program that helps high school students prepare for the ACT and the pre-ACT.

"They're finding out about themselves, what their interests are, what career might be a fit for them," Rothmeyer said about Xello.

Another part of the approved plan includes being with the same teacher all four years for the ACP hour, allowing for more consistent advising and mentoring, according to Rothmeyer.

"We look at that as having an adult at school they can talk to in terms of classes and careers and interests," she said.

For those who are ready for standardized tests or who have made some decisions on their future jobs, the time period can also be used to volunteer for organizations that align with the students' career interests. The time can also be used to meet with the high school's guidance counselor, Stephanie Gruber, to get assistance when applying to colleges.

Rogowski feels that the focus on seeking careers is worth the daily time set aside for students.

"A lot of them didn't have a solid post-secondary plan that was geared toward their interests and aspirations," Rogowski said. "So, I think one of the things we're finding, and I'm seeing ... there's a lot more targeted interests and efforts by our students to say, 'These are the types of fields that I'm interested in. What kind of courses and pathways do I need to take at WBHS to be successful and maybe lead me to a field of study or a post-secondary institution that supports my interests?"

Some of the students already shared their interests during parent-teacher conferences earlier in the school year via a Powerpoint presentation, according to Rogowski.

"That received the best turnout for the conferences," he said.

In the two years that the district has been helping students develop ACPs, the data shows that those students score higher on the ACT, a requirement for high school juniors.

"We found that students on the ACT exam that had career and post-secondary plans with a goal in mind and were taking courses leading toward those interests were scoring significantly higher on the ACT than those that had no plan whatsoever," Rogowski said. "Part of this is about making sure they have a vision for their future or at least a target in mind."

The ACP also makes use of the district's youth apprenticeship program, which lines up students with local businesses that can give them hands-on training for the careers they're interested in. Over 60 WBHS students are enrolled in the program.

"That's incredible for our size of school," Rothmeyer said.

Another part of the plan involves the school district's partnership with Northcentral Technical College to offer dual-credit courses, earning both high school and college credits. According to Rothmeyer, the past year has shown 539 college-credit courses taken by students.

The plan is not limited to the high school, though, according to Rothmeyer. The plan also encourages career exploration to the elementary grades. She noted one such event included a trip for second grade students to the Plover Exploration Center, something that was developed entirely by students affiliated with the Wittenberg-Birnamwood FFA.

"Our second graders were able to explore food, farms and agriculture," Rothmeyer said. "That was organized by our own students, so there were some leadership elements. That sort of stuff is happening as well in our district."

From a high school counselor's perspective, Gruber thinks having a plan in place will make it easier for students to find their way in the world and know early on what they want to do.

"I think the thing that I like the most about it is that it gives the students time and space to focus on post-secondary planning and what they might be interested in," Gruber said. "We can show them different career paths that they might not have thought of."

A new dental professional degree is coming to Wisconsin

Northcentral Technical College prepares to offer the state's first dental therapy degree program

Northcentral Technical College in Wausau is preparing to train new dental therapists through the state's first dental therapy degree program.

According to the <u>National Partnership for Dental Therapy</u>, dental therapists focus on routine dental care, such as cavity fillings, and are "specifically trained to extend routine care into chronic shortage areas." They're trained similarly to dentists but on fewer procedures.

Statewide dental therapy licenses became <u>available</u> in January as part of an effort to redress the shortage of dental professionals in rural areas of Wisconsin.

Laura Ahonen, Associate Dean of Allied Health & Human Services at Northcentral Technical College in Wausau, told WPR's "Wisconsin Today" that \$2.2 million in grant funding from the state is allowing the school to make the changes necessary to launch the program.

"We have actually moved very quickly," Ahonen said. "Alongside [developing] the curriculum ... In January 2025 we completed constructing a classroom that will seat 20 students and house 12 simulators that provide real high-definition and high-tech learning environments for students."

When talking to "Wisconsin Today," Ahonen also explained more about the school's next steps in welcoming its first cohort of dental therapy students.

The following interview was edited for clarity and brevity.

Kate Archer Kent: Can you talk about what stage you're at in enrolling and recruiting students?

Laura Ahonen: The Commission on Dental Accreditation requires us to obtain initial accreditation status before enrolling students, so we're waiting for the review of our application before we can enroll students in our dental therapy program.

We hope that we can enroll 12 students every fall semester. We'll primarily recruit within our Northcentral Technical College district, but if we are not able to find 12 students here, we'll expand that outreach to anybody within the state of Wisconsin. Then, if capacity allows, we can open it up to out of state students.

KAK: You're launching at a time when the dental care profession, especially in rural areas of Wisconsin, is seeing a <u>loss</u> of dentists. Will a program like this be able to improve that situation?

LA: Absolutely. That is the reason that this program is so important. A dental therapist will function similarly to a physician's assistant in how they provide mid-level medical health support.

If a person goes for medical care and they are treated by a physician's assistant, there really isn't any difference in coverage from the insurance standpoint, and so we anticipate it will be very similar in oral health care.

Whereas a dentist is trained in approximately 400 procedures, a dental therapist is trained to the same level as a dentist in about 95 procedures. The primary goal of dental therapists would be to provide restorative care, such as filling cavities and simple extractions of teeth that will allow an individual to eat foods, live pain-free and have a better overall quality of life.

We hope that dental therapists will allow for faster access to dental care and provide more equitable oral health care within the state of Wisconsin, including uninsured or underinsured patients.

KAK: Do you think patients will be ready to see dental therapists, or will they have reluctance about not being able to see a dentist?

LA: We know that one of our biggest challenges is to build awareness and to educate both the public and the dental community about the role of dental therapists.

I think it will take time and a lot of outreach education, but we will also partner with our local clinics and dental facilities to help educate patients and dentists as to what dental therapists can do.

KAK: Will Wausau community members be able to achieve better oral health because of the expansion of your dental <u>clinic</u>?

LA: Absolutely. We've had a dental hygiene program for many, many years. Right now, we have over 400 patients on our dental hygiene waiting list, and that's not including those phone calls where we can't even put them on a waiting list because the person needs an extraction or a filling. Since we don't have a dental therapy program yet, we currently cannot provide that service. It's been very difficult to turn those patients away.

We're really looking forward to the day when those phone calls come in and we can say, "Yes. We have a dental therapy program, so we can meet that need for you."

We get hundreds of phone calls a month from patients who don't know where else to call. We are really looking forward to the time when we can provide some assistance for those people. With such a long wait list in Wausau, I have no doubt that this is a needed service. This is long past overdue.







Edgar junior thrives in Youth Apprenticeship program

Addy Nowak has some advice for her peers at Edgar High School: try the Youth Apprenticeship program. You'll like it.

"I think they should definitely try it if they want to get work experience," said Nowak, a junior who is currently working at Aspirus Hospital's Phlebotomy Department through the program. "It's a good thing to do."

The Youth Apprenticeship (YA) program allows students to gain work experience for pay while they are still in high school. They also take courses that relate to their field at the high school or a technical school. Edgar has YA programs in a variety of areas including manufacturing, ahealth care, child care, early childhood education, business administration and IT.

"I know we are very rural but Youth Apprenticeship is not just agriculture," said Kris Federwitz, the district's School to Career coordinator who oversees the YA and co-op programs.

There are 28 students participating in the programs this year.

Federwitz said the programs give students a chance to learn firsthand about a field they may want to pursue after school.

"It's good to learn all aspects of a field no matter what you go into," she said. "It's a way to take what you're learning at school and apply it to what you're doing on your job."

The participation of many local businesses makes the programs successful.

"We have amazing community partners," she said. "We work together."

Addy began the YA program in phlebotomy after attending a meeting at Northcentral Technical College (NTC) and learning about the shortage of phlebotomists. By getting students involved in high school, the goal is to have them continue to train in the field after high school to ease the shortage.

Kristin Troyer, phlebotomy supervisor at Aspirus and Nowak's supervisor, said the high school junior is the youngest youth apprentice the hospital has ever had. Troyer said Nowak has a strong work ethic and is always willing to pick up extra shifts when she can.

"She's doing a fantastic job," Troyer said. By partnering with the school district in the YA program, Aspirus hopes that some of the apprentices will return to work there after they finish school. Troyer said the program has other benefits as well.

"It's teaching them the value of work, hard work," she said. "It's a great program and it's great that these kids can get into it."

There are one-year and two-year YA programs. Nowak, who is signed up for a one-year program, must work at least 450 hours at the business partner per year. She started the program last summer by working at Aspirus and taking a class at NTC.

During the school year, she has to take a career-related class each semester. Last fall, she took chemistry and algebra. This semester, she is taking a class in body structure and functions that is taught at the high school but will earn her dual credit at NTC and the high school.

Federwitz said Nowak has fallen in love with her field.

"She adores it. She loves learning and she loves her classes. She's going to be fantastic in this field," she added.

Nowak has been interested in the healthcare field for a while. She works about 20 to 36 hours per week in the phlebotomy lab. One of her favorite parts is working with the patients.

"I like talking to the patients. It's always fun to cheer people up," she said.

She started by working day shifts at the hospital where she just did blood draws on patients and sent them to the lab for testing. She has switched to night shifts, which she finds more interesting because of its variety. In addition to blood draws, she has assisted with trauma cases and patients who have had strokes.

Although the work is interesting, it can also be personally challenging.

"The hardest part is seeing kids in the hospital," she said. "And when you see people who are close to passing and you can't do anything about it."

In addition to the YA program, Addy plays volleyball and is a member of the FCCLA (Family, Career and Community Leaders of America) club. She also is part of the Little Buddy program where she mentors a thirdgrade student. "I like to help people," she says. That certainly shows.

NTC Youth Apprenticeship Program Partners with Peoples State Bank to Build Future Financial Leaders

Northcentral Technical College (NTC) continues to strengthen its commitment to workforce development through its Youth Apprenticeship (YA) program. Peoples State Bank has long been a strong supporter of the YA program, mentoring high school students in the finance field for nearly 20 years.

The YA program connects high school students with local businesses to bridge the gap between education and employment. By working directly with professionals, students develop technical skills, workplace confidence and a deeper understanding of industry expectations, all while gaining academic credit and getting paid. At Peoples State Bank, YA students gain hands-on training in the financial industry, preparing them for potential careers in banking and finance.

Vicki Mauritz is the Customer Service Representative (CSR) Area Manager for Peoples State Bank and often mentors the YA students.

"It's a great opportunity for students to feel what it'll be like in the real world," she said. "They get an early glimpse of the real world at a part-time level so they're not just jumping in with both feet at once."

Izzy Vardon, a senior at Marathon High School, has worked as a CSR at the Peoples State Bank branch in Marathon for the past two years. She first heard about the YA program as a young child, when her brother was a YA student at Peoples State Bank.

"When my brother was doing it, I was obsessed with the idea of working at a bank and handling money," she said. "When this opportunity arose for me, I took it, and now it's set me on my path for the future."

YA students at Peoples State Bank gain firsthand exposure to banking practices, customer engagement and financial literacy. These experiences help students develop an understanding of banking fundamentals, including transactions and account management.

Sam Dassow, a junior at D.C. Everest Senior High School, has been working at the Peoples State Bank in Rib Mountain for the past eight months, and he said the job provides a unique opportunity compared to most jobs that are available to students still in high school.

"I've developed skills in customer service and built a connection with [the customers] because it's the same people you're working with over and over," he said. "You're learning good skills to have, especially when you're not sure what you're going to do when you grow up."

By learning directly from industry experts, students gain technical expertise and develop skills such as communication, problem solving and teamwork.

"I'm proud of how I've grown through the seven months I've been here," said Ella Hildebrandt, a student at the D.C. Everest IDEA School who works at the Eastside branch. "It's been an experience I'll never forget and keep with me my entire career."

Scott Staszak is the Talent Acquisition Manager for Peoples State Bank and works to recruit and hire YA students to work at the various branches. He also discovered his interest in the banking industry through a school-to-work program similar to YA when he was in high school.

"Hopefully they discover they like a career in banking, but at the very least they get the experience to work with customers, which is something you'll do in almost any field you go into," he said. "It also gives them exposure to learn how to handle finances, which is a huge plus because they're young and learning."

The staff at the bank are there for students when they have questions and need help.

"Everyone is really helpful," said Devin Alves, a junior from D.C. Everest Senior High School who recently began working at Peoples State Bank. "If I ever have a question, they always know what to do."

The YA program helps students put learning into practice. Most of the students currently working for Peoples State Bank have or are taking classes through their high schools related to finance, such as personal finance, economics, intro to business, accounting, and financial math, but the YA program gives them the unique opportunity to see it in action in the real world.

"School can teach you a lot of stuff, but it's completely different when you have to apply it and you see it being applied every day in the real world," Sam said.

The YA program also emphasizes the importance of professionalism and workplace readiness. Students are encouraged to develop time management skills, maintain a strong work ethic and understand the expectations of a professional setting.

Sarika Lee, a junior at D.C. Everest Senior High School, began working as a CSR through the YA program at the Weston branch of Peoples State Bank this past fall.

"I love the professional work environment," Sarika said. "Through working here, I have really developed the ability to multitask. I've really enjoyed the hands-on learning experience."

By the time they complete the program and graduate high school, they are well prepared to transition into full-time employment or further their education with a strong foundation of knowledge and experience.

"Being a part of the YA program puts you a step ahead of all your peers," Izzy said. "There's really no other experience like this. Having that experience puts you on a path to success in the future."

While the YA program is beneficial for the students, it is also beneficial for the businesses.

"We are here to help teach them and help them get their feet into the real world, but we also rely on them just as much," Vicki said. "They are employees, and we need them and love having them here."

Students do a variety of jobs at the bank to assist customers, jumping in wherever they are needed each day, which helps them to learn more about the process and gives them the opportunity to work with a lot of people on a more personal level.

"I am bilingual and speak Hmong," Sarika said. "It's really nice to be able to help those customers who don't speak English as their primary language and make sure they feel helped and included."

By fostering strong industry partnerships, NTC works to help foster skilled, career ready individuals with a competitive edge in the job market.

"YA has created a bridge between the businesses and the schools," Scott said. "They get to talk to the students, and students have the chance to figure out industries and job opportunities that are out there."

The success of this program highlights the importance of collaboration between educational institutions and businesses in preparing students for the workforce.

"It creates a healthier community," Scott said. "A community is only as strong as its people, and if people are leaving, you're not going to grow. The goal is to create a pipeline of talent that stays in the community."

Over the years, Peoples State Bank has hired a number of high school students who went through the YA program to work at the bank full time after graduating. Several of the students currently in the program are planning a future in finance, largely due to their experience through the bank.
