Issuance and Sale of General Obligation Promissory Notes

**POLICY 1.1 – Presidential Expectations** – The President, in execution of his/her duties, shall not cause or allow any practice, activity, decision or organizational circumstance which is either irresponsible or in violation of commonly accepted business and professional ethics, or that results in failure to be accredited by the Higher Learning Commission

**INTERPRETATION:** To avoid violation of commonly accepted business and professional ethics NTC will follow Wisconsin statute 38.16 "District Tax Levy (2) The district board may borrow money and levy taxes to be used for the purchase or construction of buildings and for additions, enlargements and improvements to buildings and for the acquisition of sites and equipment. In financing activities under this subsection, the district may issue its bonds or promissory notes under ch. 67 to pay the cost thereof."

**DATA/RESULTS:** The attached resolution is passed each year in order to notify taxpayers of the District's intent to borrow for capital expenditures. A notice will be published in the local newspaper informing the taxpayers of their right to petition for a referendum within 30 days. If no petition is received, the District may proceed with quotations for the borrowing.

The total capital expenditure of \$14,917,172 was approved at the March 12, 2024 board meeting. The sale of promissory notes of \$13,500,000 will include this authorization at the April 9, 2024 board meeting.

# RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE BORROWING OF \$13,500,000; AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION PROMISSORY NOTES THEREFOR

WHEREAS, it is necessary that funds be raised by the Northcentral Technical College District, Clark, Langlade, Lincoln, Marathon, Menominee, Portage, Price, Shawano, Taylor and Waupaca Counties, Wisconsin (the "District") for the purpose of paying the cost of the District's 2024-25 Capital Budget, to wit: construction of building additions on the Wausau Campus (not to exceed \$1,500,000); construction of building additions on the Merrill Campus (not to exceed \$1,500,000); remodeling and improvement projects (not to exceed \$1,500,000); building and site maintenance and repairs; site improvements; and equipment acquisition, installation and related costs (the "Project"), and there are insufficient funds on hand to pay said costs;

WHEREAS, the District hereby finds and determines that the Project is within the District's power to undertake and serves a "public purpose" as that term is defined in Section 67.04(1)(b) of the Wisconsin Statutes; and,

WHEREAS, technical college districts are authorized by the provisions of Section 67.12(12) of the Wisconsin Statutes to borrow money and to issue general obligation promissory notes for such public purposes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the District Board of the District that:

<u>Section 1. Authorization of the Notes</u>. For the purpose of paying the cost of the Project, there shall be borrowed pursuant to Section 67.12(12) of the Wisconsin Statutes, the principal sum of THIRTEEN MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$13,500,000) from a purchaser to be determined by a subsequent resolution of this District Board.

<u>Section 2. Sale of the Notes</u>. To evidence such indebtedness, the Chairperson and Secretary-Treasurer are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to make, execute, issue and sell to said purchaser for, on behalf of and in the name of the District, general obligation promissory notes in the principal amount of THIRTEEN MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$13,500,000) (the "Notes").

Section 3. Notice to Electors. Pursuant to Section 67.12(12)(e)5 of the Wisconsin Statutes, the District Secretary-Treasurer will, within ten (10) days of adoption of this Resolution, cause public notice of such adoption to be given to the electors of the District by publishing a notice in <u>The Wausau Daily Herald</u>, the official newspaper of the District. The notice to electors shall be in substantially the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u> and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 4. Prior Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the District or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.

**TOPIC:** Remodeling: Wausau – CHS Dental Clinic Renovation

**POLICY: Wisconsin Statute 38 – Technical College System, 38.14 District Board Powers –** (2) Buildings and Equipment. (a) For the use of the district schools the district board may: (3) Construct, enlarge, or improve buildings.

**TCS 5.04 (4) (a)** A resolution of the district board approving the remodeling of existing facilities, (b) A resolution of the district board requesting board (WTCS) approval of the remodeling.

**INTERPRETATION:** Remodeling of existing facilities requires Board approval.

**DATA/RESULTS:** The CHS Dental Clinic Renovation Project aims to enhance and expand the facility by renovating approximately 2,832 square feet of the existing dental clinic. This renovation aligns with the Dental Therapy Addition and expansion of dental hygienist and dental assistance programs, as supported by the passing of legislative bill AB 667/SB 702. The project is budgeted not to exceed \$465,000, supporting the clinic's commitment to providing quality oral health care education and services. The key modifications include transforming the lobby and reception area to accommodate more patients, ensuring patient confidentiality, and increasing security. The project also involves increasing locker room capacity for additional students and program offerings, as well as relocating faculty offices from the 4th floor to the 1st floor. Two private offices will also be added for the on-site dentist and dental therapist. In order to begin construction in June, the College will be requesting WTCS State Board approval at its May Board Meeting. The NTC Board is asked to approve the proposed renovation and request the WTCS State Board to do the same. A packet evidencing compliance with the statutes will be submitted to the State Board with the application.

**TOPIC:** Addition: Wausau – CHS Dental Therapy Addition

**POLICY: Wisconsin Statute 38 – Technical College System, 38.14 District Board Powers –** (2) Buildings and Equipment. (a) For the use of the district schools the district board may: (3) Construct, enlarge, or improve buildings.

**TCS 5.04 (2) (a)** A resolution of the district board approving the additional or new facilities, (b) A resolution of the district board requesting board (WTCS) approval of the additional or new facilities.

**INTERPRETATION:** Addition of new facilities requires Board approval.

**DATA/RESULTS:** Northcentral Technical College (NTC) is set to embark on a transformative project with the construction of a Dental Therapy Addition, thanks to the recent passage of bill AB 668/SB 689 that allocates \$2.0 million in funding to NTC. The initiative aims to expand the current dental hygienist and dental assistance programs, introducing a cutting-edge dental therapy program to tackle oral health issues and enhance access to dental care. Graduates from this innovative program will be eligible for licensure as dental therapists. This project, not to exceed \$1.3 million (\$1,300,000 from state appropriations) will encompass a 3,055-square-foot addition featuring a new vestibule, a new classroom, and twelve state-of-the-art dental operatories. This expansion not only increases capacity in existing dental programs but also introduces new offerings in dental therapy and Expanded Functions Dental Assisting (EFDA), further positioning NTC as a leader in comprehensive oral healthcare education. In order to begin construction this summer and have the dollars expended by June 2025, the College will be asking the WTCS State Board for approval of this project at its May Board meeting. The Board is asked to approve the proposed addition and request the WTCS State Board to do the same. A packet evidencing compliance with statutes will be submitted to the State Board with the application.

- 6. Maintain a competitive benefit package to attract and retain qualified talent.
- 7. Abide and comply with all applicable employment-related state and federal regulations.

Wisconsin Statute 38.12 (3) requires the District Board to approve compensation of District employees.

**INTERPRETATION:** The Board must authorize wage and salary adjustments for employees.

#### **DATA/RESULTS:**

Board authorization is requested to implement July 1, 2024 salary/wage adjustments for employees. The proposed adjustments are aligned with the 2024-25 fiscal planning parameters presented to the Board and do not deviate materially from the geographical or professional market for the skills employed.

For regular employees, the following is proposed for 2024-25 and includes:

- 2% adjustment to the overall structure of the pay plan;
- 3% increase to the control point of the grade added to the base wage as a flat dollar amount

### Agenda Item 4: Instructional Area/Program

#### A. Industry Trends

<u>Keele Westcott</u> reported that there has been an increase in referrals to DVR compared to last year, thanks to NTC's Disability and Services team. CPA grant funding remains available as additional funding has been awarded. Currently, there is no current waitlist. The State of Wisconsin has been successful in providing extra funding for certain career pathways, enabling continued assistance for students. The team is currently preparing for the Spring Semester.

<u>Robert Bauer</u> noted an influx of referrals from NTC. FSC currently holds a QUEST grant aimed at potential participants in Early Childhood programs. Funding is available for both adult and dislocated worker programs in these occupational fields.

<u>Sara Bartelt</u> mentioned collaboration with NTC's Workforce Training Professional Development department and the Northcentral and Northern Wisconsin Development board. The team has developed a certificate consisting of the first three classes in Early Childhood Education for both the technical diploma and associated degree programs. These classes are bundled into a certificate for qualified students who will undergo a screening process to be accepted for the QUEST grant, which covers one hundred percent of the cost of these three classes. The grant funds must be used by September 2024, and the classes will run consecutively online from January to August.

<u>Nicky Lindman</u> reported that at Mid-State, in addition to tuition assistance, FSC was able to provide gas mileage reimbursement, laptops, and help with utility payments, all funded through the QUEST Grant. The grant can address various barriers. The WIOA Program is facing a vote for a twenty percent reduction in the adult program and complete elimination of the youth program. Although these reductions are not confirmed, they are currently up for vote this week. Despite these potential changes, both the youth and adult programs have seen a high number of referrals and enrollments, which is positive.







#### A. Current RT Openings

*Gary Nikolai, Aspirus Sleep Program-Wausau* -they do not typically hire new graduates right out of RT school; for sleep they want RTs to at least try their chosen field that they have just gone to school for in RT prior to jumping into a sleep lab position. They do currently have a couple of current openings

*Heidi Obry, Aspirus Wausau Hospital*- They do have multiple RT openings in all of their locations. New hires come in as entry level RTs and then they have opportunities later for a RT Level 2 position advancement. They are in a much better place than they were 2 years ago when the Study Group first started talking as a group; at that time, they had double digit openings.

Kristy Hicks, Aspirus Rhinelander Hospital and Howard Young Medical Center- Woodruff — They currently have 2 FT openings for RTs at Howard Young and right now they need 4 FT RTs at Rhinelander to meet their staffing matrix.

**Alison Riedel, Marshfield Clinic Marshfield –** 4 FT and 1 PT (and more not posted) RT openings; from a system standpoint more listed.

**David Warren, Aspirus Medford Hospital-** All RT positions are currently filled. Looking forward to having RT students coming onsite eventually.

Mary Rehlinger, Apria Healthcare- Always looking for RTs

**Lynn Waldera, Aspirus Divine Savior-Portage -** All RT positions are currently filled, but they have a potential opportunity that may be coming.

**Mike Tracey, Aspirus Home Medical-Wausau** - All RT positions are currently filled. They just added a new position in January.

**Wendy Kremnitzer, Marshfield Medical Center-Weston -** They currently have 6 RT positions posted-they definitely have a need for RTs.

#### B. What's going well in the industry? Feedback for potential students.

**Gary Nikolai, Aspirus Sleep Program-Wausau** -other opportunities in the field; job variety by being in different wings of the hospital. Most places are willing to hire students as an RT aide after their 1<sup>st</sup> year.

**Heidi Obry, Aspirus Wausau Hospital-** stability of the field and viability of a medical career choice. Collaboration with high schools and other institutions to try to engage learner's interest in the field.

Note: Angela spoke about K-12 programs and said that we are always game for collaboration and going out to speak and show things, as well as for dual credit. She discussed our willingness to show our programs and discussed our willingness to collaborate. Angela also talked about the opportunity for real people doing the job to come and talk to students.



**Alison Riedel, Marshfield Clinic Marshfield** – She was at a conference and said that it is so important to engage students in the WSRC and the AARC and really support those entities and encourage the use of all of the resources available to RT students.

**David Warren, Aspirus Medford Hospital** - make a very good living without going into so much debt; adrenaline rush. He also mentioned the feeling of knowing that people depend on you as being a benefit; when things are not going well with a patient and they need you there as a part of the team.

**Lynn Waldera, Aspirus Divine Savior-Portage -** You can work for a smaller rural hospital and see a great deal of variety from day to day since there are only a couple of RTs on staff.

### **College-Wide Initiative**

- Brad Gast provided updates on the dental therapy program at NTC
  - Brad shared that this program has been approved by the state and Governor of the state and NTC will be the pilot location for this program
- Brad shared the plan for the Forensic Science Center being built this year on campus
  - In partnership with Marathon County and the state, construction will start in the summer of 2024
- Brad provided updates on the Sawmill project happening at the Antigo Campus
  - Brad noted that it will be a fully functioning sawmill and will be the epicenter for that training

  - o April noted that they are increasing, they will have 3 Millwright and 1 Electrician

  - Katie shared that the requirements are a 400 hour apprenticeship program and a Journeyworker card. Students can start to complete the courses while in their apprenticeship program. They will get 39 credits towards the degree.

- Katie shared that there are programs that are always on the low enrollment list, which is Maintenance Technician and Machinist Tool & Die.
  - Katie notes that the trades are of need, but we cannot continue to maintain cohorts of 3 students
  - Katie shared that they are in the works of a plan to give the apprentices what they need but still being responsible
  - Katie explains that if students want to attend the Fall term they need to have contracts submitted by July 15<sup>th</sup>, 2024

#### Welcome and Introductions

Ken Parker, Associate Dean of the School of Engineering and Advanced Manufacturing at Northcentral Technical College (NTC) welcomed everyone to the meeting, thanked them for attending, and led the group through introductions.

## **Highlights From the Previous Meeting/Updates**

The previous meeting minutes were distributed to the committee for review. There were no corrections to the meeting minutes however, there was a follow-up note to the information regarding the Wausau School District restructuring. Aaron Hoffman, D.C. Everest, informed the committee that the plan to consolidate Wausau East and Wausau West High Schools is no longer under consideration. Both Wausau high schools will remain open for the foreseeable future. The meeting minutes were unanimously approved as reviewed.

## **Industry Discussion**

The majority of members shared that business has been very good. They all had a very positive outlook for their business going forward. Committee members shared the specifics about their companies as follows:

 David Williamson, A-Team Machine, stated that business has been very steady with new projects. The supply chain has not been an issue as it has been in the past. He has seen more errors in fulfillment of orders.

## **Machine Tool Advisory Committee**

- Mark Synder, S&R Truck LLC, stated that their machine tool shop is not quite as busy as in the past. They are currently interviewing for a Sales Manager. The aerospace market seems strong.
- Andrea Ollhoff, Wausau Window & Wall, shared that the company will be seeing several changes going forward. Wausau Window and Wall will be called Wausau Fab and Assembly and Linetec will be called Wausau Finishing. The curtainwall system market is not as robust as it has been in the past. The company will make the window market their main focus going forward.
- Aaron Hoffman, D.C. Everest, gave the committee an overview of their Machine Tool and Welding programs at the high school. Currently, there are 78 students enrolled in their Welding and Machining class. This will matriculate 40 students into Advanced Welding and 6 into Advanced Machining. The school district is going to be revamping the welding and machine tool labs at the junior high school to give the eighth and ninth graders a better learning experience. He also mentioned that their STEM Robotics class has been running consistently with an enrollment of approximately 24 students.
- Allision Dean, Northwest Tool & Mfg., stated that business is steadily increasing. At the end of 2023, they had the largest increase in new customers than any other point in time. Northwest Tool is expanding and diversifying their customer base. Finding employees has been challenging so the company is concentrating on increasing efficiencies. Employees have done a superb job in this area. We have recently gone to four, ten-hour, days with a half day on Fridays. They have added a horizontal mill and has been a valuable addition. For the 2024-25 fiscal year their emphasis will be on automation.
- Brad Cisewski, Point Precision, stated that the recreational and aerospace markets are seeing an increase in business. They have projects underway investigating how lights-out automation can give their employees a better work-life balance. Brad feels business could increase every year for the next five to six years. They also produce hydraulic manifolds for lifts such as skyjacks or scissor lifts.
- Loren Beyersdorff, Greenheck, shared that the Machine Development Center has moved into a new building, increasing their current 19,000 square foot space to 69,000 square feet. They are ramping up building parts and equipment. They are mainly building robots and robotic cells.

## **Program Enrollment**

- We have 9, second-semester, students and 6, third-semester, students. The new curriculum was implemented for the first-semester students this fall. The curriculum modifications have been successful in giving the first-year students more programming experience. We have 16 students enrolled in the apprenticeship areas of Tool & Die, Machinist, and CNC Technician Machinist.
- Promotional events are being done throughout the year by staff. The next event will be a combined high school event along with our NTC Open House on April 24, 2024. That event will bring in about 600 students. There is a Career Fair for Engineering and Advanced Manufacturing on Wednesday, March 6, 2024. The Skills USA High School Regionals were held at NTC and six Machine Tool students will be moving on to the next level of competition. There is a 2-day Machine Tool Camp being held in August promoting the program. Metal Masters Quest is scheduled to start after July 4<sup>th</sup>. We are working on how to incorporate our mobile lab into our recruiting process. The Heavy Metal Tour is tentatively scheduled for October 2, 2024.
- The committee was provided information on changes that are being considered for the machine tool labs at the Antigo and Phillips campuses. We are assessing the best use of the equipment and physical space allocated for the machine tool program at these regional campuses.


this option. Advanced placement will help with student interest in Civil Engineering.

- RECRUITMENT Heidi and Michael have been looking at promoting this program in the area schools,
  especially with ninth and tenth graders. Fall is the optimum time to get the students to NTC to explore our
  programs with hands-on activities. Heidi asked if the committee members could provide her with any
  pictures that they may have of their companies for her to include in presentations for recruitment. Drone
  footage would be a great way to get students interested. Heidi would like the photos or any other
  information as soon as possible.
- INTERNSHIPS Two students are looking for internships in the Wausau metro area for this summer. It was mentioned that DC Everest is very open to promoting NTC, whereas, the Wausau District seems to promote four-year universities. We need to get more students on our NTC campus to see what we have to offer. Just in cost-savings, only our college is an excellent choice for students. Stephanie asked if the committee could be given a list of high schools in our district. Heidi will get a list from our K-12 division and provide that to the committee. High school counselors are invited to our campus twice a year and provided promotional materials to take back to their high schools. Discussion was had on when are K-12 students are introduced to engineering programs and what is the optimal grade for recruiting.

- PLACEMENT Civil Engineering has 100% placement of students. The students that are in the program are very dedicated to the industry as a career. Committee members asked if the instructors felt that they could accept a more students into the program. If the program would have an enrollment of 12 students some of the activities would have to be reformatted to accommodate those students. There maybe a bit less of the hands-on aspect of the program but it would be doable. The program needs would be assessed to make sure students will be successful. As a class reaches five students there is more interaction.

## **Industry Discussions**

- Jim Volkman, Department of Transportation, voiced his concern over the number of employees who will be retiring in the next two to four years. Vacancies are being filled with engineers and specialists but the DOT is losing others through retirement. When a seasoned employee leaves, it is very hard to replace their institutional knowledge base with a new person. It was mentioned that there are pros and cons to working for the government versus the private sector. It is totally up to the individual's preferences. The pay raises that have come across throughout the industry have been very beneficial in acquiring and keeping employees.
- Kevin Boyer, EMCS, mentioned that there is quite a difference between the pay scale for a starting individual with a two-year degree and an individual with a four-year degree. The two-year degree pay rate

is higher in many cases. Also, the difference between the student debt for a technical college degree and a university degree is very different. Heidi asked any committee member interested in providing a testimonial promoting a technical college degree to let her know. Several high schools are involved in STEM or STEAM technology and therefore, are including engineering in their presentations to students. Kevin felt that we should not forget that the private elementary schools as another option for promoting the program.

- Brandon Bradley, Integrity Grading & Excavating, shared that his company is extremely busy doing estimating and fieldwork. They could also use another ten foremen in the field. Companies need to lay out the path for new employees showing them expectations relative to their knowledge and production level. His company has an internal training program.
- Nick Pehler, Jewell Associate Engineering, Inc., added that finding the right hire is important but finding
  the right place to work is extremely important also. The remote working environment is still challenging
  for many companies.
- Stephen Opatik, USDA, stated that contractors are busy and there is a very tight bidding market. Federal funding levels are consistent and Wisconsin DNR is still working through bill funding so the heavy market will continue for several years. Contracts in wastewater, rural healthcare, rural solar, and agriculture are very strong.
- Stephanie Christensen, EMCS, stressed that interpersonal relationships have to be honed by new hires which is just as important as the knowledge base of an employee. Any new hires being considered need good communication skills. It is critical to be able to communicate in multiple fashions.

#### Welcome and Introductions

Heidi Latendresse thanked everyone for attending. Introductions were made.

#### Highlights from the previous meeting/updates

The previous meeting minutes were distributed in advance for the committee to review. There were no specific follow-ups to discuss from previous meetings.

#### **Industry Discussion**

- TRENDS Members of the committee felt that the industry is trending in the right direction. Orders seem to have dipped for the first quarter of 2024 but look promising for the remainder of the year. A few companies felt that their customers have had jobs quoted only to have those jobs delayed or put on hold due to budgetary issues, scope changes, or design modifications. It was mentioned that a good indicator of how business is doing is the Architectural Building Index (ABI). If this index is under 50 there is concern but if the Index rating is 50 or higher it means that new work is being awarded. Some companies, depending on their size, are still working on a backlog while another is looking at building more distribution centers around the U.S. to meet their growing requirements.
- HIRING OUTLOOK Companies are having employees scale back to a forty-hour week, cutting back the overtime. Businesses have been able to acquire experienced people through changes in the hiring market and recent layoffs. Certain companies are using the option of hiring out their design work.

HOUSING MARKET – The housing market is seeing a lot of projects for multi-family housing versus
commercial. Quoting volume is increasing for area businesses. There may be a price increase in oriented
strand board (OSB) shortly which impacts businesses. Our area has a good mix of multifamily and
residential, which is good. There is still a shortage of housing units. Even when interest rates are high,
individuals go to remodeling versus purchasing a residence.

#### Skills and Knowledge

- Members shared that the skills taught by NTC have been very beneficial. The students they have hired
  have been very capable. Overall, the committee felt that our training was very good. There was a
  discussion on having the students take a scenario from a residential or commercial customer and produce
  working drawings for that individual. NTC does not do this for residential buildings as the program would
  compete with local designers and liability is an issue. On the commercial side, students have provided
  schematics but not working drawings.
- The transfer program with UW-Milwaukee has been used by several area employers and their employees. There are a few design classes that have a varied curriculum from NTC to the UW-Milwaukee but the classes were still transferable. It was felt that getting students to job sites during their education is important. Getting students to understand the intricacies of building design such as load transfer, need to be learned by new employees.
- Currently, students are looking at putting together a multi-tenant, one-story, housing plan for a property
  adjacent to the Antigo Campus under the direction of the NTC Property Foundation. This housing would be
  used as temporary housing while the main housing unit is being constructed for the Wood program. Vicky
  Jeppesen, Director of Resource Development, and Executive Director of the NTC Foundation, has been
  impressed with the work of the students thus far. This project will cross over using both commercial and
  residential knowledge.
- Discussion was held on how long credits are viable to use toward finishing a degree after a student has been away from school for several years. Returning students are given every opportunity to seamlessly finish a degree. All of the credits and classes should be able to be credited toward a degree with the addition of possible credit for work experience. We have tutors that work in the classroom along with instructors to help any students struggling. Tutors are available outside of class for additional help.

#### Job Placement

- Second and fourth-semester enrollments are lower due to the loss of some students to the job market. The job market for new employees is very open right now. We need to stress to employers that students need to continue their education as well as acquire work experience.
- There was an average of 3-5 students working in each of the area businesses represented at the advisory
  meeting. Committee members agree that they have had great luck with the students from NTC. With
  some layoffs in the area, other companies have been able to acquire some experienced designers.

• The impact of retiring workers on the workforce was discussed. Some businesses have a very good retirement plan which has made it possible for them to lower the overall age of their workforce, allowing them to decrease the impact of succession on their workforce. NTC will have several faculty retirements in the next five or six years but these are managed on a case-by-case basis.

#### **Program Updates**

One of the fourth-semester students and two of the second-semester students are part-time. It was noted that the first-semester group of students is made up of 50% women. ## Video game skills score VHS state title

The esports team from Valders High School won the Division III state championship on Saturday in Wausau.

Coach Jason Kunde said he expected the team to go all the way to winning Division III.

"They were going up against the top teams in their division," he said. "People there were not expecting us to win.

"They did a great job this season. I am super proud of them for what they are able to accomplish."

Kunde said he saw the team play exceptionally well throughout the season.

"Having watched them throughout the season, they had it locked in," he said. "Just the way they played and communicated, I would not see any other team doing something like that."

The team is in its second school year and fifth season, as esports has three seasons a year.

Even with just a short time in the league, Kunde said the Valders team has experience.

Captain Caleb Mangin attributes the team's success to its experience playing the game. He and teammates Jon Knedle and Isaac

Mangin, his younger brother, have been playing the video game Rocket League for about seven years.

"It helps to have seven years of experience," Caleb said.

That experience includes losing, Isaac added.

"Losing is just part of everyday life," he said. "It is how we handle adversity. Through the adversity, what do we learn about ourselves and about our team?"

Winning state is much better than the fourth- or last-place finish the team had at state a year ago, Isaac said.

"I am really proud because we handled adversity well," he said. "We did better than we did last year. From the start, we knew we had an edge on the competition.

"Once we won our first game at playoffs, we knew that we could win the whole thing. It was really rewarding to advance from fourth to first in a just a season."

To advance to the tournament at North Central Technical College, the Valders team went 7-0 during the regular season and then won two more rounds in a playoff tournament, Caleb said.

"They were all best-of-five matches," he

said. "We did not drop a single game. We beat every team we played 3-0 in matches."

This year, Kunde said the Valders team had more time to prepare for state than it did last year, because the state and playoff tournaments were further apart.

"It was a lot easier this year," he said.

At the state tournament, top-seeded Valders easily defeated fourth-seeded Barron. In the final, the Vikings lost their first game of the season.

This had Valders and Stevens Point Pacelli tied after two games.

Valders needed to assess the situation and did that to win, Isaac said.

"We had to figure out what we could have done or what we should not do to let them get another win," he said.

Then, the Vikings went on to win two more games to win the tournament.

"27 wins and one loss for a season record," Caleb said.

After winning Division III, Valders played the Division II champion and lost.

Caleb said the Valders team did what it expected in winning Division III.

"We all had the same purpose," he said. **See Champs p. 13**

## Tittl bills aid those with disabilities

The state Assembly recently passed two bills authored by Rep. Paul Tittl, R-Manitowoc, that advance progress for spinal cord injuries and access to handicapped parking spaces.

"Today was a win for Wisconsinites with physical disabilities," Tittl said. "First, we passed a grant program for spinal cord injury research."

The program includes a spinal cord injury council that will set criteria for awarding of grants. The council also will review and recommend grant applications.

## \$370M in public projects in the pipeline after state Building Commission gives OK

Gov. Tony Evers on Wednesday announced the Wisconsin State Building Commission gave the thumbs up to \$370 million worth of projects across the state.

The commission decides on public projects to build and upgrade new state facilities that support state agencies, universities, technical colleges and more. Evers said in a statement that projects will help boost the local and state economy.

"Whether it's upgrading historic venues like Camp Randall, modernizing educational facilities for our future generations, or making sure our state parks have the resources and support they need to succeed, this funding is necessary to continue building the economy and infrastructure of tomorrow," Evers added.

Here are the top projects the commission approved.

- The Camp Randall Sports Center replacement project and demolition of the McClain Athletic Facility at the University of Wisconsin (UW) Madison. The design/build project will create a new indoor football practice facility. The replacement facility will push the limits of the existing space, boost the campus' capacity for national recruitment and make the institution a competitor for peer schools. UW Madison officials asked for more than \$285 million.
- A \$7 million Regional Forensics Science Center at the Northcentral Technical College in Wausau. Coroners, medical examiners, law enforcement personnel, district attorney offices and emergency medical and health service providers will get training and continue their education in north central Wisconsin.
- The commission endorsed the Construction Manager delivery method for a new UW Madison Veterinary Diagnostics Laboratory in Barron County. The method lets the owner give input to a construction manager during the design process. The laboratory had biosafety level needs and higher demand over the years, and the project is expected to address those needs.

- Construction of a \$2.58 million entrance visitor station at Potawatomi State Park to serve around 240,000 people who visit each year.
- The release of half a million dollars in Stewardship Property Development funds for Friends Group grants for the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources to use for nonprofit conservation groups.
- Approved \$4.44 million to replace two hangar doors at the Army Aviation Support Facility in Madison.
- Renovations at Birge Hall, Brogden Hall, and the Integrative Biological Research Building for the College of Letters and Science at UW – Madison

- Renovation of the Health Science Laboratory, including a new laboratory suite addition at UW – Parkside.
- Approved nine facility maintenance and repair projects for state agencies such as the Department of Corrections, Department of Health Services, DNR, Department of Transportation, Wisconsin Historical Society and the UW System.

Evers is the chair of the state Building Commission. The members are state senators Brad Pfaff, Joan Ballweg and André Jacque, state representatives Jill Billings, Rob Swearingen, Robert Wittke and citizen member Barb Worcester.

The replacement facility is designed to optimize existing space, bolster the campus' capacity for national recruitment, and uphold competitiveness among peer institutions while maintaining essential support for student athletes.

Forensics Science Center on the Northcentral Technical College campus in Wausau. This facility will provide crucial training and continuing education opportunities to a wide array of professionals, including coroners, medical examiners, law enforcement personnel, district attorney offices, and emergency medical and health services providers across the North Central Region of Wis-

- Authorization for the implementation of the Construction Manager (CM) alternative delivery method for the renovation and expansion project at the UW-Madison Veterinary Diagnostics Laboratory (WVDL)-Barron County. 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## Guidance counselor shares student post-graduation data with school board

More girls apply for scholarships than boys. That, among other data, was shared at the Feb. 19 Board Conversation by high school guidance counselor Brennan Schrader, who shared post graduation student outcomes as gathered from the National Student Clearinghouse.

"National Student Clearinghouse is a non-profit that collects data from the universities to send it to the federal government," Schrader said of seeing where students are after graduation at Stanley-Boyd. "It's not me going in and asking every kid...it's straight from the colleges about where they've gone, how long they been there, anywhere that they've been."

With over 3,600 participating colleges and universities, Schrader said that the likelihood of students going to schools outside of those with National Student Clearinghouse "are very slim." Tracking the past eight years of graduates from Stanley-Boyd, Schrader had several takeaways in his presentation to the board.

Before attending college was getting there.

"How many of our kids are going to college after high school?" Schrader asked, showing a graph that with a pandemic caveat. "You will notice right around that COVID time there's a large drop and that's nationwide," he said of students in college.

With an average of 56 percent of students attending college immediately after graduating high school, the graph data showed a peak of 64 percent in 2019 followed by a drop to 53 percent the following year, the figures closing out at 51 percent in 2023, the most recent year available.

As to college choices, public schools topped the list, with Chippewa Valley Technical College (CVTC), UW-Eau Claire and UW—River Falls the top three, several other UW schools following. Other colleges attended by Stanley-Boyd alumni include the University of Minnesota, Viterbo University, Augsburg University, Carthage College, Winona State, Iowa State, Marian University, St. Norbert's University, Minnesota State University Moorhead, Northern Michigan University, and Northcentral Technical College. A small percentage of students chose private over public for postsecondary education, the figure dropping to zero in 2020 before topping out at seven percent in 2023.

As to length of stay, four year institutions have enjoyed a preference, topping out at 49 percent in 2018 to just 12 percent for two years, before narrowing the gap in 2020 to 27 percent four year to 26 percent for two year institutions. The gap reopened with 336 percent at four year institutions in 2022 to just 12 percent at two year, before narrowing once more to 33 percent at four year institutions and 18 percent at two year ones in

2023. The overall enrollment rate for postsecondary education was 51 percent in 2023 for Stanley-Boyd graduates, up from 48 percent in 2022. As to enrollment numbers, these are followed class fluctuations, with 38 of 64 students enrolled immediately out of high school in 2016, 53 of 85 in 2017, 44 of 72 in 2018, 47 of 74 in 2019, 27 of 51 in 202, 37 of 76, in 2021, 32 of 66 in 2022, and 43 of 85 in 2023.

Also included in the report from the National Student Clearinghouse was a finding that in-state institutions enjoyed an advantage over out-of-state ones, a double digit gap topping at 61 percent in-state to one percent out-of-state (a 60 percentage point gap) in 2017, then narrowing to 40 percent in-state and 11 percent out-of-state (a 29 percentage point gap) in 2023.

Of those students who enrolled in college after high school and then returned for a second year, figures start at 72 percent in 2016, rise to 74 percent in 2017, and top out at 91 percent in 2018, before decreasing to 78 percent in 2019, 74 percent in 202, and 71 percent in 2021.

Second year attendance at private institutions started at 100 percent in 2017, fell to 50 percent in 2017, rose to 100 percent in 2018 and 2019, before falling to zero for 2020 and 2021. All institution attendance roughly mirrored public institution numbers.

As to institution type for those returning students, students attending two year institutions returned at a lower rate than those attending four year ones. Beginning in 2016, those returning to a two year institution for a second year were 53 percent compared with 86 percent for four year, rising to 57 percent for two year in 2017 to 85 percent for four year, and hitting 75 percent return to two year compared with 97 percent for four year institutions in 2018. Two year institutions then decreased to a 73 percent return rate in 2019 compared with 81 percent for four year, 46 percent in 2020 to 100 percent for four year,, and 50 percent in 2021 to 86 percent for four year institutions. Out of state institutions were favored for second year return, the only exception being 2018, when out-of-state returns fell to 88 percent compared with 91 percent for in-state returns. As with previous categories, the overall rate of second year return aligned with in-state institutions, the overall return rate for second year being 77 percent as spread across both in-state and outof-state figures.

As to degree completion, a difference emerged when measuring the class as a whole versus those who had enrolled

"So when we send them off to college, do they get the diploma they start off with?" he said.

With the percent of those who completed a degree within six years being 37 percent for the Class of 2016, and 45

percent for the Class of 2017, for an overall average of 42 percent. The vast majority of these degrees, meanwhile, were from four year institutions, with out-of-state locations having a lower return rate than in-state ones on de-

gree completion.

The above percentage figures reflect each class as a whole, rather than just those seeking a postsecondary degree. Approximately one-third or just under this for each of the above class have not been to college or in the National Student Clearing-house database.

Of those in the database

and seeking an associates, bachelors, or higher degree from within the Class of 2016, a plurality of 12 percent graduated within four years, another 12 percent doing so within five years. Of the remainder from 2016, two percent took six years, while six percent graduated in two years or less and five percent took three years. 1.6

percent of 2016 graduates, meanwhile, were new to college in the 2022-23 academic year.

As for the Class of 2017, a the number graduating within four years rose to 20 percent, A with another

11 percent taking five years. Of the remainder five percent took six years, seven percent two or less, and two percent took three years. A full 1.2 percent of students from the Class of 2017 were new to college in 2021-22 and 2022-23.

With more recent cases still well within the data collection window of eight years, initial figures show a large drop in college enrollment in 2020 following the onset of the pandemic, with 41.2 percent of this class not included within National Student Clearinghouse data. Conversely, some 5.9 percent of the Class of 2020 have already graduated postsecondary education, while 21.6 percent of the class persisting, out of an initial 51 percent college enrollment for the class. Two percent are new to  $\epsilon$ college.

state average.



# Schuette Metals donates \$38,000 to bring advanced robotics to Wausau East students

WAUSAU – Students at Wausau East High School will be able to learn about advanced robotics technology used in local manufacturing companies after a donation from Schuette Metals of Rothschild.

Schuette Metals is donating \$38,000 to purchase a Fanuc Robot, a six-axis robotic arm that is becoming more common in modern factories. The company made a similar donation to Wausau West High School in 2022, according to a news release from the Wausau School District.

John Peterson, president of Schuette Metals, points to his passion for "Industry 4.0," a term used since 2016 to describe a fourth industrial revolution that involves advanced robotics, artificial intelligence and gene editing, as motivation behind the donation in the release.

"Students operating robots in their high school classes that are the same as in the local manufacturing companies allows us to help grow their knowledge and better prepare them for their future careers," Peterson said.

Students who complete the district's robotics curriculum may also earn dual enrollment credits through Northcentral Technical College.

"Schuette Metals has been a tremendous business and education partner in helping us develop our students with the competitive advantage they need for success in the future," said Jon Winter, career and technical education coordinator.

The donation is received in partnership with a grant from the Department of Workforce Development through a program that supports technology education in schools across the state. Annual funding for the grant program varies between \$1,000,000 in 2020 and just over \$500,000 for the application period closing April 16, 2024.

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## Spencer School Board approves strategic planning process

The Spencer School District has decided to initiate a strategic planning process to provide a guiding document and framework for making major decisions regarding the district.

At the March 20 school board meeting, Jason Gorst, 7-12 grade principal, outlined a couple of proposals for strategic planning. One was JSC Consulting led by Dr. Joe Schroeder. The cost for Schroeder to lead the district in creating a five-year strategic plan would be \$14,700 plus expenses. Schroeder is an associate executive director of the Association of Wisconsin School Administrators.

Schroeder has assisted in strategic planning for the McFarland, Somerset and Lake Mills school districts. His model for strategic planning includes a weekend intensive in which a group of 25 school district stakeholders meet all day on a Friday and half a day on Saturday to work through a strategic plan. The cost includes examining and revamping the school district's mission, vision and values.

Jason Gorst also got a quote from Nexus, as the school district already planned to do a facilities study with that company. It would cost \$2,740 to do a strategic plan with that company, and it would take four to six months to complete. Gorst recommended starting sometime in August and finishing in the new year.

Strategic planning sessions would take place on week-day evenings, which Gorst felt would be more convenient for staff and community members, and lead to better results. The plan does not include mission, vision and values, but Nexus said those could be added on for an additional fee.

"My recommendation would be to go with Nexus (instead of JSC Consulting) because it's a significant cost savings, the structure of it fits us better and it will fit with our facilities study because it's the same company," said Gorst.

Board members agreed with Jason Gorst's reasoning.

"If we think we can get more engagement by having the sessions after school rather than on the weekend, then I think we should do that," said Becky Gorst.

One of the board members also asked about community engagement and how to make sure the public was looped in on the process.

"There are a lot of engagement surveys that go out to the community and staff so they're part of it," said Jason Gorst.

Board member Jordan Buss said he was willing to approve the Nexus proposal, but was curious in potentially revisiting the school district's mission, vision and values. He asked Jason Gorst if he could reach out to Nexus and see how much it would cost to add that on, which Jason Gorst said he would do. Buss made a motion, seconded by Barb Wesle, to approve a strategic planning initiative with Nexus. That passed unanimously.

Other business

Also at the meeting, the principals and administrator each gave a report.

Jason Gorst shared about ACT testing. The juniors had ACT testing the week of March 11. The other high school students were sent on field trips that day to create a quiet environment for testing. They went to Northcentral Technical College, Mid-State Technical College or UW-Stevens Point to see what educational opportunities were available there

Gorst said the school employed some new strategies to try and minimize the number of "tankers," that is, students that just open the test and click through it as fast as possible without trying. Those strategies included having staff members that students felt connected to reach out to individual students to encourage them to do their best on the test. Gorst said he would also be offering a picnic to students who did well on the test, showed growth or showed evidence they were trying their hardest, with the top scorers earning a steak.

Gorst reported the music department went on a trip to New York, which went well. Graduation will be May 18 at noon. He also said that Children's Wisconsin was looking for a place in the school to provide counseling.

"We're looking at maybe repurposing one of our old staff rooms, as we want to provide ease of access for mental health services," said Gorst.

A couple of staff members attended the WISEdata

Conference held March 6-7 in Wisconsin Dells. WISE is the Department of Public Instruction's school data system and "there's more and more to it every year," said Gorst. He said he was looking at creating a district data team to send to the conference every year "to make sure the data that is getting pulled from the state is extremely accurate and everything is in line there."

District Administrator Mike Endreas provided a school budget update.

"We're in good shape in regards to next year's surplus. We're looking at a decent size there with a mill rate of 9.33. I wouldn't get too upset or too crazy about the mill rate as of yet, because we were very conservative on the property values. So the property values I think we projected at 3% but we anticipate that being higher. So, the higher your property values go will have an adverse effect to mill rate, so I think all in all, things are looking very good. We only did a three-year budget.

"And in 2025-26 and 2026-27, be cautious as well. That'll be a new governor. The new governor's biennial budget will be those two years. We're in the second year next year, 2024-25. But projections or guesses for the next two years look pretty promising as well. We also ran this out because as you recall, we had to ratchet up our referendum. We had a tiered one and that'll be the last year of our tiered referendum monies as well. So things are playing out fairly well with all the current projections and data we have."

Endreas also brought up the March 14 incident at the Crandon School District in which 39 people were sent to the hospital due to symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning and the school district was shut down, not to reopen until April. Endreas said he contacted Complete Control because he wanted to know the state of Spencer's system.

"We do not have carbon monoxide detectors in our school. The difference between Crandon and our school is Crandon had furnace units in each classroom, and that's what failed. So their furnace units service a bunch of classrooms and are pushing that air into that. We have a couple air handlers, in talking to Complete Control. I think there's one in our gymnasium and so forth. And they said it's not a bad idea and it doesn't cost a ton of money, so we'll be in the process of putting carbon monoxide points there. If it gets to a level — we have an alarm system on all our HVAC, anyway, so we'll put some points on our alarm system there. And then he said the other area would be, because everything's contained within the boilers, it wouldn't be a bad idea to put some points in the boiler room as well. So that's kind of our plan."

He said he hadn't gotten quotes for that yet, but he would return to the board once he had that information.

"I always look at situations like that, if something happens, learn from it and react to it," Endreas said. "If it's not that big of a reach to put sensors in, why not?"

Republican State Assembly members also plan to file a bill that would require carbon monoxide detectors in all Wisconsin schools. The proposal would include a process for districts to get reimbursed for costs associated with purchasing the detectors.

Also, the board approved an annual CESA (Cooperative Educational Service Agency) 10 service contract for \$40,028.

"It used to be \$150,000 to \$200,000 probably 15 years ago, but they've had a lot less services over the years," said Endreas.

He said the district was in the process of evaluating the CWETN (Central Wisconsin Educational Television Network) piece of the contract, which allows students to take classes taught by teachers in other area school districts remotely over the TV, as there may be just as good of options, if not better, available through Rural Virtual Academy (RVA). The school district will have to notify CESA by Aug. 1 if it plans to get out of the CWETN contract for the following school year, but Endreas recommended they keep it for now.

The CESA contract was approved unanimously.



## NTC adding simulation center to School of Public Safety in Merrill

NTC introduced interactive simulations in their College of Health Sciences back in December.

MERRILL, Wis. (WSAW) - Getting students hands-on experience before they enter the workforce is a crucial step to their success outside the classroom.

That is why North Central Technical College is implementing more real-life simulations for students to grasp what it's like in their field of work.

NTC introduced interactive simulations in their College of Health Sciences in December 2023. Staff say they are seeing success in just a few short months. And it has opened the door for adding simulations to more of its departments—this time, in their College of Public Safety.

They are just one step away from adding a new simulation center to their School of Public Safety.

"The health sciences, with their recent expansion into 'Industry 4.0', and the development of their immersive simulation experience for the program, has led the way to the development of this," said Shane Heilmann, director of public safety and community safety simulation center at NTC.

The simulation center will give students an opportunity to practice how they would respond to various public safety situations.

"Could be a situation involving law enforcement, where they're responding to a residence. And we would place a customized scenario around the participant based on what is needed," said Heilmann.

The scenarios will consist of students handling critical incidents. These simulations might take place in an alley or inside a healthcare facility.

"The experience of being placed in certain demanding situations, and then having successful outcomes working through those situations," said Heilmann.

It is something Heilmann believes will serve as a benefit to NTC students as they prepare for careers in law enforcement and fire service.

"We're giving them the most realistic education and direct path to have success when they move into those positions," said Heilmann.

NTC has been in the planning process since November. The simulation center will be located in Merrill. Heilmann says they will sign the building agreement by the end of March to make everything official. Once that happens NTC can start planning how they want to design the inside of their new public safety simulation center in Merrill.



# Wausau Fire Department proposes apprenticeship program to address staffing shortages

WAUSAU, Wis. (WSAW) - As workforce struggles continue to plague Wisconsin, Gov. Tony Evers is making his rounds across the state to highlight needs in various career paths.

The Wausau Fire Department is proposing an apprenticeship program that will give people the opportunity to network with staff and see if it's a career path they want to take.

Wausau Deputy Fire Chief Justin Pluess said he hopes this apprenticeship will not only keep people in the Wausau area, but also bring others from across the state. It's something he says will allow fire crews to work with people of all ages to gauge their interest in becoming firefighters.

"This apprenticeship program would allow the opportunity for someone to go to school, obtain all the training and certifications required, while also being able to earn some income so that they can pay the bills," Pluess said.

Pluess said this program would allow Wausau firefighters to train people of all ages with the required certification in just one year – compared to the standard two. Up to 12 people at a time would get training in paramedics, physical agility, and clinicals.

"Create really well-trained firefighters and paramedics that are highly sought after by other local career departments," Pluess added.

You don't need to be from the Wausau area to be in this program either. It's something community partners like Northcentral Technical College say will help fill the firefighter shortage gap in not just Wausau, but other communities as well.

"By providing the human capital to fill those open positions, these are very important positions in the communities to help keep communities safe," said Shane Heilman, director of public safety and community services for NTC.

Gov. Evers believes, if given the right resources, the program will be a success. The Wausau Fire Department and their community partners could not agree more.

"Hopefully it catches on, and it not only benefits our community, but expands out to the other communities in Wisconsin and ultimately the Midwest," Heilmann said.

This apprenticeship proposal is still in its early stages as it still needs city approval. With the right resources though, the department hopes to get the program started by June of 2025.



## WISCONSIN'S FIRST DENTAL THERAPY PROGRAM PLANS TO SUBMIT ACCREDITATION PLAN BY JULY

Work is underway to establish Wisconsin's first dental therapy program.

Gov. Tony Evers last month signed into law a <u>bill</u> that will bring the mid-level dental care provider to Wisconsin. Dental therapists, who are similar to physician assistants, provide preventive and restorative services. They'll limit their practice to dental shortage areas and specific <u>settings</u>.

Evers also approved a separate <a href="measure">measure</a> allowing the state's technical college system to submit a plan for legislative approval on how to spend \$20 million on oral healthcare workforce initiatives. Part of that funding will head toward creating a dental therapy program at Northcentral Technical College in Wausau. The campus hopes to welcome its first dozen students in fall 2025, depending on how the accreditation process goes.

"It is a huge undertaking," said Deb Koziel, the college's dental hygiene program director. "We have a really large responsibility because it is the first in the state. But we're excited about it, we're honored that we have been selected and we know we're up for the task."

Laura Ahonen, associate dean of allied health and human services, said the need is there.

"There's a two-year waiting list right now to take Medicaid patients at dental clinics that take Medicaid patients," she said. "Dental health is so important to overall health. To be able to be part of the solution for the underinsured or for the patients that have limited access, that's something to be proud of."

Koziel and Ahonen recently spoke to Wisconsin Health News.

Edited excerpts are below.

### WHN: Why is Northcentral Technical College pursuing this program?

**Koziel:** We try to be trendsetters, as far as being on the cutting edge. We realized that there's a need. We wanted to be actively involved. We realized that this was going to have a large impact on our community, as well as the state of Wisconsin. It was our intent that anytime that this particular opportunity arose that we were going to be involved as much as we possibly could.

## WHN: Where does the program stand?

**Ahonen:** We're on track with developing the program, from the physical building addition and building remodel to hiring and curriculum. We're on track with our accrediting body. Right now, our accrediting body is the Commission on Dental Accreditation, CODA. CODA requires us to submit an application that includes our building facilities' specs, the curriculum, who our faculty will be and who we will have to teach the program. Our plan is that we will submit that plan to CODA by July 1.

#### WHN: What types of capital projects are you undertaking?

**Koziel:** We actually have a dental hygiene and a dental assistant program currently. We are going to be expanding our clinic. We have two different projects that are going to be going on. One will be a renovation, and one will be an expansion.

We're going to be adding on eight additional operatories into our clinic environment. We're doing a completely different layout of our locker room to accommodate the additional students. We'll also be starting an (expanded function dental auxiliary) program at the same time. So we're going to be having those additional students as well. We're going to be making some modifications in our lab area to meet the needs.

When the dental therapy students are first starting to learn, they're going to be working on a simulator or a mannequin type of a setup. So we need to have space big enough for those simulators as well for their first year, while they're learning the skill. Once they perfect it, then they can of course move on to clinical patients, but they need a good stronghold. So we have to find a space that's going to accommodate these particular simulators. Being that we're going to have 12 students, we need to have


a lab space created for that. So we're looking at creative opportunities within our current health science building as well for that particular unit.

#### WHN: How are you recruiting faculty?

Ahonen: CODA actually sets the requirements for faculty, and a dental therapist needs to be trained at that same level as a dentist. If you imagine a dentist can do 100 things, a dental therapist can maybe do 70 of those things. But whatever they can do, they have to be trained at the same level as a dentist is trained. So CODA requires then that our faculty are at that level. We need a dentist to be our program director. Anybody else teaching in the program has to be trained to that level. So you could have a dental therapist. But, because we don't have any dental therapy programs in the state, we anticipate that our first hire would be a dentist to help us get the program off the ground.

#### WHN: Are other colleges looking to start programs?

**Ahonen:** There's a lot on our shoulders to get our program off the ground because I'm sure that we will then be assisting other colleges. The Wisconsin Technical College System likes, if possible, to have what we call statewide curriculum. So if we offer a certain type of program, a student can get that same experience at any of the 16 technical colleges that offer it. We know that we will be the first one. Then once we are completed and we are up and running with students, other colleges can then start.











I started the day early on my own farm helping deliver a new lamb, then headed to NTC for the celebration (then later our state board meeting in Fon du lac).



P.S. Did you know agriculture is the only industry required to be represented on our state technical college board? It's an honor to serve on our state board and represent agriculture.
























Join us in welcoming Officer Smith to the Edgar Police Department!
