EMPLOYEE – FOCUSED ACTIVITIES

1. <u>Recruitment of Employees and Talent Sourcing</u>

- Continue job announcements with targeted groups or agencies, including Wisconsin Diversity.com. Ensure faculty and staff position postings include language to promote diversity in attitude and practice. Increase HR presence or provide job announcement materials to employees to disseminate at campus or community events such as the Veteran Military Expo/Job Fair and Business Expo.
- Continue diversity interview question(s) in selection process for all positions.

2. Employee Development and Training

- All hiring supervisors need to complete interview bias training and review the Recruitment Manual to streamline processes and incorporate additional information on bias, diversity, equity, and inclusion.
- The Executive Leadership Team (ELT) have DEIA goals to support the College strategic goals. ELT members will lead the College DEIA efforts.
- All new employees are required to complete an online New Employee Orientation module which consists of Title IX training and Sexual Harassment training.
- Library Services offers curated library resources and materials for equity and inclusion topics.
- Inclusion Committee created to focus on the College's policies and practices with the intent to enhance a culture of inclusion, expanding and enhancing College efforts to build a community of belonging, emphasis on how grants can be more aligned with our inclusion goals and how data can be used to clarify and support our programs, and create opportunities to collaborate on activities throughout the College and the community.
- NTC expanded the Virtual Center for Innovation and Inclusion this academic year. Faculty shared leading practices in equitable instructional techniques, DEIA professional development opportunities and asked their peers for guidance in DEIA matters.

STUDENT – FOCUSED ACTIVITIES

Recruitment of minority/LEP students/Recruit and support ABE/ELL students' transition

- NTC participated in three in-person and three virtual Wisconsin Education Fairs during the 21-22 academic year.
- NTC hosted blended in-person/virtual open house experiences in Fall 2021 and Spring 2022 both at the Wausau and at Regional Campuses
- K12 staff continued to work with all NTC school districts to support minority students' postsecondary
 planning and enrollment. NTC's Academy Specialist has continued to work this year with these school
 districts but also with organizations like Hmong American Center, Boys & Girls Club, and others to build
 relationships with participants. These organizations serve traditionally more diverse students. The
 Academy Specialist is also the point of contact for Alt High and increased efforts have been placed on
 that collaboration/transition. Alt High has dedicated staff to help students with transition to NTC as well.
 In addition, we offer the Youth Apprenticeship program to all these schools as well and support them
 with both their postsecondary and employment efforts.
- The Viewbook has been translated and distributed again in 2021-2022, as well as other recruitment materials such as Open House materials, K-12 Parent Newsletters, and other GED/ELL materials, scholarship information, and Career Services job search assistant information. Two testimonial videos were created and translated for social media.

- An ELL Construction Fundamentals program was offered at the Medford campus with support from a Spanish interpreter.
- A Spanish interpreter was available for Open Houses.
- Online ELL courses were offered with increased enrollments in 2021-2022.
- NTC is involved in supporting the Marathon County Afghan Refugee Committee and providing ELL services and transition services for students seeking postsecondary education opportunities.
- Career Coaches participated in the Hispanic Heritage Month celebration event to provide information about NTC programs, which included a podcast.
- NTC maintains an ongoing partnership with Independent Living/Youth in Foster care to support students' awareness of the Youth Apprenticeship program, as well as college opportunities.
- NTC's Pathway Advisor supports and guides ABE/ELL students' transition into post-secondary coursework.
- Dual Credit courses continued to be offered at nearly all District high schools including schools with high minority populations such as Abbotsford, Menominee Indian HS, White Lake, Bowler, and Wittenberg. NTC also partners with many school districts to offer the Youth Apprenticeship program to their students.
- NTC continued recruitment of low-income students into NTC's Promise programs and provided dedicated support to these students.

<u>Recruit females into School of Engineering and Technology and School of Advanced Manufacturing and</u> <u>Transportation programs</u>

- Activities and events to promote programs were offered again in-person this year. Events for students to
 explore STEM careers were included in the Career Exploration Days. Groups from the Girl Scouts, Boys
 and Girls Club, and Alternative High School came on campus to explore programs, as well as from
 various schools across the district. Activities were also held for students to explore Electrical Power and
 Gas Utility, and Engineering. NTC hosted a number of summer camps focusing on STEM careers such as
 Metal Masters Quest, Welding, Civil Engineering, and Machine Tool camps; Women in Industry camp;
 Cosmetology boot camp; Make It Real camps; and Girls Make It Real.
- NTC created a Youth Apprenticeship video highlighting a female welding student that is posted on the website.
- Job-related workshops, employer presentations and mock interviews were held virtually and provided opportunities for females to meet others employed in the field.
- Welding and Wood Technology contests were held in June.

Recruitment of students w/disabilities

- The Accommodations Services Coordinator and/or other Disability Services staff attended transition meetings in Taylor, Marathon, Price, and Langlade County to share resources and support/advise area high school Special Education staff.
- The Accommodations Services Coordinator presented to local high schools and to instructors of dual credit courses on transition services. She also presented this academic year at Taylor and Marathon County Transition events.
- High Schools brought transitioning students to tour NTC and meet with Disability Services staff, and individual students met with staff during the College Exploration Day in April 2022.
- NTC partnered with the Marathon County Transition Committee, the Wausau School District and D.C. Everest School District to host a county-wide, in-person transition event.
- The Antigo Campus partnered with the Antigo and White Lake School Districts to provide two 3-credit certificate programs for students with disabilities this school year. The first 9-week course was Foundations of Customer Care and the second 9-week course was Foundations of Culinary basics.

Activities to support retention/completion of minority students/students with disabilities

- Targeted outreach to students with disabilities who are transitioning for Fall 2022 began in late March and continued through the summer.
- An Orientation to Accommodation Services is planned for students beginning in Fall 2022.
- Blackboard Ally was implemented in Spring 2022 to allow students to download alternate formats to make course materials more accessible.
- Disability Services continued to be included in the mandatory New Student Orientation for new students to learn how to receive accommodations, and become familiar with support available as well as assistive technology.
- Through targeted grant activities, minority students and students with disabilities continued to receive intensive advising/case management services. Advisors and the Accommodations Services Coordinator access student progress information in Canvas, which supported better case management.
- A Predictive Analytics model has been continued each 8-week term to identify students who may need additional support to be successful. The model was expanded in Fall 2021 to include General Education courses. Advisors, instructors and other staff provide outreach to identified students to determine if resources or assistance are needed.
- Mandatory advising continued for students in most programs.
- Timberwolf Ready sessions introduced new students to NTC systems: E-mail, Canvas, their My NTC student account, what is needed for class, learn how to read their schedule, etc.
- Sessions on how to use Zoom video conferencing software were offered for students.
- Expanded laptop loan and laptop scholarship opportunities continued to be available to students.
- Student Life offered scholarship application workshops to students.
- College 101 continued to be required for students to support their success in college and in life.
- Tutoring and Academic Coaching was available through the Academic Resource Centers, with flexible appointments available through Zoom.
- The Academic Resource Center/Timberwolf Learning Commons offered workshops on Conducting Research, APA, Exam Study Tips, Writing, Math, Notetaking, Time Management, Active Reading, and Email Etiquette.
- Starfish Early Alert included an intake form which helped identify students needing support services. Starfish was used for case management of all students, but also supports other initiatives including faculty advising, the Promise program, students using the Academic Resource Center, Disability Services, and students taking Enhanced General Education courses.
- Enhanced general education courses provided concurrent ABE support while a student took Written Communications or College Math post-secondary courses.
- Instructional Assistants supported key low-completion or gatekeeper courses.

Professional Development to build cultural competence and inclusive culture at NTC

- Student Life shared e-mails weekly that included DEI topic information, activities, and links to resources. Examples include information/activities for Suicide Awareness, Hispanic Heritage Month, Disability Awareness, Indigenous People's Day, MLK Jr. Day, African American History, Women's History, Hmong Heritage Month, LGBTQ, Sexual Assault Awareness, bias and stereotype training, and more. The NTC Library now has 26 topical research guides on these and many other subjects for students, faculty and staff to access.
- The Testing and Accommodations Coordinator presented on the topic of accommodations to faculty and adjunct faculty during the Spring 2022 Faculty Development Days/Adjunct Faculty Orientation
- Nine NTC staff and faculty attended the Holistic Student Supports Conference in Fall 2021. This conference highlighted topics focused on diversity, equity, and inclusion.

- One staff member attended the National Conference on Race and Ethnicity in Higher Education (NCORE) conference in May/early June. Information from the sessions and resources were shared out to others in the college.
- Sixty staff and faculty have now been trained in Mental Health First Aid (MHFA), 20 during the 21-22 academic year In Fall 2021, 8 student workers were also trained in MHFA. MHFA has been added to Sum Total so faculty and staff can register easily and upload their certification.
- A staff member attended the virtual Wisconsin Indian Education Association conference in April 2022.

Agenda Item 4: Instructional Area/Program

A. Industry Trends

<u>Colt Nicklaus</u>: Forward Service Corporation (FSC) has been noticing that their main referrals are coming in from high school juniors and seniors. There are program requirements for meeting out of school youth. Their #1 referral sources for outside school youth are still probation, parole, and offsets. For the adult and dislocated worker referrals, and as we get closer to the start of school it takes FCS about 3 weeks to enroll a participant into the program.

<u>Nicky Lindman</u>: LETC Youth Adult Program had 8 students participate in NTC's culinary cohort boot camp this summer. This was an 8-week program which consisted of a 3-week bootcamp and 5-week internship. It was a successful event and received well by who participated.

<u>Robert Bauer</u>: Latest update to the Dislocated Workers Program. It is now being handled by Forward Service Corps.

Liberty Heidmann: NTC now offers a career panning assessment tool called "Focus 2 Online Career". It is



a self-paced online assessment for occupation and career planning. Once completed students are encourage to make an appointment with a NTC career coach.

<u>Brian Kalish</u>: Northcentral Wisconsin Workforce Development Board is still offering the Rural Healthcare Grant (COW). Nursing students from NTC working in the Langlade or Lincoln County area are encourage to apply. The WAI grant is coming to an end. A QUEST grant focusing on childcare is still being discussed, including how to apply will follow.

<u>MaiGer Moua</u>: NTC is still currently accepting applications for the NTC Scholarship Promise Program. It is a simple form that requires specific eligibility. If qualified, the program supports up to 6 credits per semester. More information can be found on NTC's website.

<u>Keele Westcott</u>: Overall at the DWD - DVR, referrals have been up in Marathon County. Last month they also hosted a successful hiring event



Save a Life: American Heart Association stresses importance of learning CPR

UNITED STATES (WAOW) — Following eighteen-year-old Bronny James's cardiac arrest incident while at basketball practice last Monday, the American Heart Association is stressing the importance of knowing how to help in an emergency situation.

They say the incident is a reminder that heart issues can affect anyone, regardless of age or physical condition, and that you have the power to help save a life.

Different from a heart attack, which is a blood circulation problem, cardiac arrest is caused by an electrical malfunction in the heart, resulting in an irregular heartbeat.

This will typically happen without warning, and within seconds, a person may become unresponsive and unable to breather. Experts say, death will occur quickly if the person does not receive immediate CPR. "Unfortunately, in out of hospital cardiac arrests, the odds are just terrible if somebody does not receive CPR and subsequent defibrillation in a timely manner." Explains American Heart Association's Chief Science & Medical Officer, Mariell Jessup. "Every family, every family, should know CRP."

Less than 45% of people in the United States have ever been trained in CPR, and of the estimated 350,000 cardiac arrest incidents that happen outside of a hospital each year, only one in ten survive. However, if CPR is administered right away, a person becomes two or three times more likely to survive the incident.

There are plenty of places right here in our area where you can learn CPR, or take a refresher course. Those include the American Red Cross and Northcentral Technical College, among others.



\$20M for technical college programs should help dental health shortages

Published: Aug. 2, 2023 at 10:44 PM CDT WESTON, Wis. (WSAW) - In Wisconsin the dental professional shortage is climbing. Right now, there's approximately 183 openings, and that's up from 137 a year ago.

"What we are seeing here is assistance that are pursuing other opportunities and they pool of applicants isn't as large as it used be," said Dr. Jeremy Hoffman, Dental Visions

According to American Dental Hygienists Association, 8% left the field during the pandemic. At Dental Visions, Doctor Jeremy Hoffman says they just don't have the same interest that was once there.

"Were having to manage shortages of hygienists and dentists, and people retiring or people who have left the workforce. Just trying to get people back into the pipeline," said Hoffman.

But Governor Tony Evers is trying to re-energize the industry, allocating \$20-million in his latest budget for technical colleges and their dental programs. That includes Northcentral Technical College in Wausau.

"We are very excited to find out how we can utilize those funds and increase the number of graduates," said Laura Ahonen, Associate Dean of Allied Health, Northcentral Technical College.

Associate Dean of Allied Health, Laura Ahonen, says Northcentral Technical College has been involved with the state and there's a new program in development. Right now, they graduate dental hygiene students once a year in the spring. They hope to be able to graduate students in the fall as well.

"These funds will allow us to expand our programing and we will be able to increase the number of graduates and expand the workforce," said Ahonen.

"That will be a really good addition to this area and to help with dental manpower," said Hoffman.

NTC has 40 dental chairs, using them for dental hygiene and dental assistant students.

Hoffman says they are hoping to add two dental assistants right now, and one dental hygienst by next year.



lron design

City gets first look at design, cost estimates for new DPW building in former Ironworks site



City leaders got their first look at

what a new Department of Public Works building could look like — as well as the price tag.

Estimates for the new building at the old Ironworks site on West Street on Wausau's west side, including some demolition needed to make the site work, show the project would cost more than \$25 million. That includes renovating part of the old Wausau IronWorks site

And that doesn't include the cost of purchasing the site, which the city doesn't own.

The city initially wanted to move the DPW to a new location because the old one is getting cramped and doesn't include enough space for its needs. Expansion on the Miron Street facility didn't make sense because even buying land around it wouldn't give it enough space.

Members of the Capital Improvement and Street Maintenance Committee heard a presentation on the IronWorks site from Barrientos, which is designing the project. Public works staff told the committee Other p last week that the new design should work Mike Galla well for the staff for years to come.

UWSP student announces run for Senate against Baldwin

A 40-year-old UWSP student is planning to challenge Sen. Tammy Baldwin where other Republican politicians have declined.

Rejani Raveendran, originally from India, announced she was planning to run against Baldwin on the Republican ticket. Raveendran moved to the U.S. in 2015, and to Wisconsin in 2017. She's the chair of the college Republicans at UW-Stevens Point and will have been a citizen of the U.S. just long enough to be eligible to serve in the U.S. Senate, should she be elected.

On her Instagram, she includes photos of herself with both Republican politicians such as Ron Johnson and Democrats such as Katrina Shankland and Attorney General Josh Kaul.

Other prominent politicians such as Mike Gallagher and Tom Tiffany have decided not to challenge Baldwin.

Cobblestone opens in Mosinee

After years of discussions, development of a new hotel in Mosinee came to an end as the Cobblestone Hotel and Suites opened its doors officially last week.

The 54-room, four-story project began construction about a year ago and will sustain 10 full- time positions to go with its lounge, breakfast area, small bar, swimming pool and meeting room. Its approximate cost is about \$8 million, it resulted in the demolition of three buildings. It will serve as an economic stimulant, one government official says.

"What we have seen after these hotels come in is tremendous growth," Wisconsin Economic Development Secretary and CEO Melissa "Missy" Hughes says. "There will be weddings here which will stay for the weekend and have a rehearsal dinner at the brewery and they will get a chance to experience Mosinee. Business meetings will be here and this is incredibly important."

The Cobblestone Hotels business is based out of Neenah and has previously partnered with the state to open other locations throughout Wisconsin since its founding in 2008. One of their specialties is setting up operations in communities which may not be served as easily by larger chains. To date they have more than 100 locations. They work through a franchising model and, whatever happens in the months and years ahead, it is a sign downtown is lively once more.

"I really think it is awesome," former alder Marge Rein says. "I wish them the best of luck. I really think there is potential ... it is nice to see our downtown is growing and vibrant again." (Evan Pretzer)

County applying for grant for new emergency team

Marathon County is applying for a new grant that would help create a new emergency team in the county.

That team, called the Medical Reserve Corp, would replace the county's current Tactical Response Team. According to Emergency Management Director Phil Rentmeester, that team is all but defunct. It's hard to staff it and the equipment is falling apart.

The grant, for \$50,000, would help Marathon County turn that into a new emergency response team, mostly staffed



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resized 70% From 004 by volunteers. That team could help participate in emergency response training, help at medical facilities in times of crisis, help dispense vaccines, help test for diseases and whatever else the situation calls for.

It's a model that other counties have used, Rentmeester says. There are also grants for ongoing costs but otherwise, the money currently going toward the tactical response team would help fund the ongoing costs of the new team, Rentmeester says.

Marathon County's Public Safety Committee approved the county applying for the grant, but will consider the idea if and when the county receives the grant.

As part of the proposal, the county would sell the aging equipment, which could be used by an entity for training purposes.

Alternative farmers market in Wausau set to open

A new farmers market is setting up shop on the city's north side.

The Wausau Alternative Farmers Market opens later this month in the Northcentral Technical College parking lot, according to its founder, Debra Weiss. The market's first day of operation will be Aug. 26, a Saturday.

The market's formation was a response to growing frustration of vendors trying to get into the existing Wausau farmers markets, and because buying and reselling is allowed at that market, Weiss said in a press release. Weiss says the new market will "give other local startups a chance, and provide the people of Wausau and surrounding areas a truly local homegrown choice, expanding the local foods and strengthening the food economy of Central Wisconsin."

Northwoods Brewery works out compromise with county

Minocqua Brewing Company looked like it was on the verge of being closed down but now, the brewery and officials appear to be working on a compromise.

Oneida County officials last week reached a deal to allow Minocqua Brewing Company time to revise its application for a beer garden, and the brewery will remain open while its permit revocation is in appeals.

Oneida County's Planning and Development Committee earlier this month revoked the operating permit of Minocqua Brewing Company after detailing numerous violations the brewery committed against the county's zoning ordinances, including parking requirements and serving patrons outside, which the brewery does not have a permit for.

Minocqua Brewing Company's owner, Kirk Bangstad, believed he was being discriminated against because of his political beliefs. He said other businesses were doing similar things to him and not being singled out. Bangstad is openly liberal in what is generally a conservative area and displayed political signs, named his beers after liberal politicians and is outspoken on social media. He also runs a liberal SuperPAC that's linked to the brewery.

The committee last week offered Bangstad 90 days to revise his beer garden permit with the number of required parking stalls. Bangstad before the meeting had hinted at a compromise between himself and the town, and even closed the day of the meeting as a show of good faith, he said.

That's a big change from a July meeting that ended in chaos with Bangstad and county officials shouting over each other before those officials abruptly ended the meeting.

From web to barbecue

Bobby Xiong went to school for web development. He and his wife are now the owners of Dijon BBQ

Since last month, Bobby Xiong's Dijon BBQ service has offered Texas-style barbecue to hungry customers throughout the Wausau area and attracted rave reviews for its mobile operation.

Items on the menu include brisket and pulled pork, it differs from other kinds of barbecue because of its slowcooked smoked style which utilizes indirect heat and came about for Xiong with support from his wife Dee due to the COVID-19 pandemic making him rethink life as it has for others.

"I always liked cooking since I was a kid but went to school to be a web developer," he says. "During COVID-19, I was working from home and barbecuing a lot and realized I liked it a lot more than the web stuff. I still had some GI Bill benefits, so I figured I might as well go to school for culinary and set the goal of eventually opening up my own food truck or restaurant."

Xiong got the education for the job his wife helps fund (the name is a play on a joke from before they were married about what her married name would sound like - Dee Xiong/Dijon) from Northcentral Technical College and quickly moved into his new career after graduating back in May.

In contrast to some who strike out on their own in a new space, he and Dee are enjoying robust support from family and friends and there has been little difficulty with setting it all up. Xiong did have to work to find a smoker, but, as luck would have it, a cheaper one was located on Facebook Marketplace.

"A brand-new smoker can cost \$19,000-20,000," Xiong adds. "I would have had to get it down in Texas and this is a lot of money, but, thanks to trolling around on Facebook, I found a guy in

his and the price dropped and dropped until I got it for \$11,000." That key piece of equipment also came equipped with portable sinks.

In contrast to other places that serve barbecue in the area, Xiong says his stands out due to the effort he puts into it. It is not uncommon for him to monitor a cook for 12 hours; in the future, he hopes to hire some employees.

He can be found at the Big Bull Falls Farm Market on Saturdays. He's starting to make an impression and he

WAUSAU – Six new bus shelters in the city will offer space for people using wheelchairs, extra protection from Wisconsin's ever-changing weather and solar-powered LED lighting that will make the shelter safer for riders waiting in the evening and more visible to approaching drivers.

"(It's a) big improvement for Metro Ride and safety with the lighting so when it's dark you feel safer in the transit shelter waiting for the bus," local transit activist Kathi Zoern said.

Wausau Metro Ride celebrated its new Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant bus shelters Monday morning outside of North Central Health Care's main

campus building. The shelters also include flat and open space for people using mobility devices and little to no slope to the boarding area.

"This is a great day for Metro Ride because it showcases our commitment not just to all of our riders but to those who have mobility impairments and use the system on a daily basis," Transit Director Matthew Rosenbloom-Jones said during the ceremony.

The six shelters that were replaced were roughly 30 years old and had "long reached the end of their useful life," Rosenbloom-Jones said.

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation's Non-Driver Advisory Committee identified that 31% of Wisconsinites are nondrivers, a figure that includes children under the age of 15.

"Not everybody has the ability to

drive or can afford to own more than one car, and they use public transit to get around town," Zoern said. "People who use public transit (use it) to get to medical appointments, food pantries, doctors or school."

Funding for the shelters came from Wausau's Metropolitan Planning Organization, according to Rosenbloom-Jones. They are located at North Central Health Care, Sturgeon Bluff Apartments, Northcentral Technical College, Kannenberg Plaza, Marshfield Clinic and Horace Mann Middle School.

"It's my car keys to independence," Zoern said. "I use the service every day. That's how I get to work. We need more secure funding for transit."







All nine students successfully graduated from NTC on 07/28/2023 with their culinary basics certificate and we couldn't be prouder! Congratulations everyone!



The second is a Helping Skills Lab, featuring a two-way mirror where students may observe while counselors have access to audible feedback and prompts.




Challenges

Connecting Classrooms

Dr. Jason Schenzel spearheaded Northcentral Technical College's upgrade to a "Connected Classroom" model, featuring web conferencing and interactive tech for improved student and faculty experiences. To create this enhanced experience, he selected Q-SYS for audio, video and control while leveraging design support from integrator <u>AVI Systems</u>. "We needed to make the system easier for end-users to access and use, so the new classroom standard was developed using Q-SYS," explained Dr. Schenzel. "This standard was a unified system, making higher education more accessible to students. The system included the use of <u>Microsoft Teams</u> and <u>Zoom</u> for internal communications and learning spaces, and WebEx for other tasks, with Q-SYS providing the AV-to-USB bridging for all the components. This was the only AV solution that our research could find that could provide the necessary multiple cameras, room control, and other features needed."







Solutions

Helping Skills Lab

The Helping Skills Lab is divided into three individual rooms. To capture video, the main room is equipped with a Q-SYS PTZ-IP 12x72 Conference Camera, while the two smaller rooms are equipped with stationary ePTZ cameras. An <u>NM-T1 Tabletop</u> Network Microphone captures audio in each room. The design of the smaller rooms allows faculty to monitor and coach the individual while ensuring privacy by preventing the other occupants from hearing the conversation. NV-32-H Network Video Endpoints distribute HDMI content and a single Q-SYS Core Nano processor manages the audio, video and control processing for all the rooms. Q-SYS TSC Series Touch Screen Controllers are located at each station, allowing a user to control the room's functions from the outside, which can be executed through mobile devices for simpler use. Instructors have the option to use Zoom, Microsoft Teams, and Panopto, which records lectures, or GoReact, an interactive cloudbased platform for feedback, grading, and critiquing student video assignments.

Dr. Schenzel explained that, besides acting as an institutional resource, the room could be used for outside services such as law enforcement training and other programs. "We would like to make it available for police interrogation training and allow it to benefit our larger community. The space was funded through the state of Wisconsin and it's the only room like it in the state."

Veterinary Technician Surgery Room

The Veterinary Technician Surgery Room is designed in a similar way to the Helping Skills Lab, however, there is an additional layer of safety in place to protect both students and observers. The room is equipped with a control panel that has the ability to quickly disable audio or video feeds in the event of an emergency situation. Furthermore, the room has been designed to incorporate far-end observers into the experience, allowing them to join the surgery team via Zoom or Microsoft Teams from any remote location. This helps ensure a safe observation environment and gives guidance to the surgery team during times of need.

When asked about the future of Connected Classrooms at NTC, Dr. Schenzel expressed enthusiasm. "Now that we have a baseline, we are currently exploring options to make the system more efficient and manageable. I don't think we could've accomplished this project without Q-SYS."
