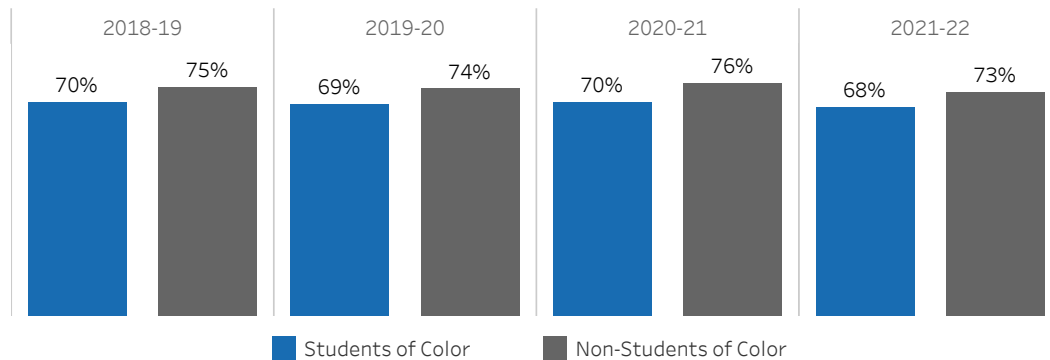

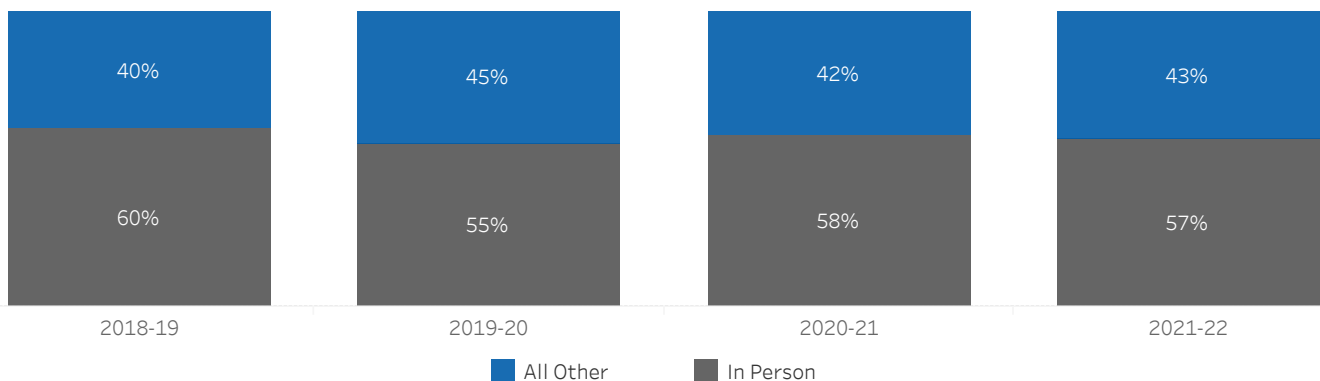
Equity Gaps — Course Completion

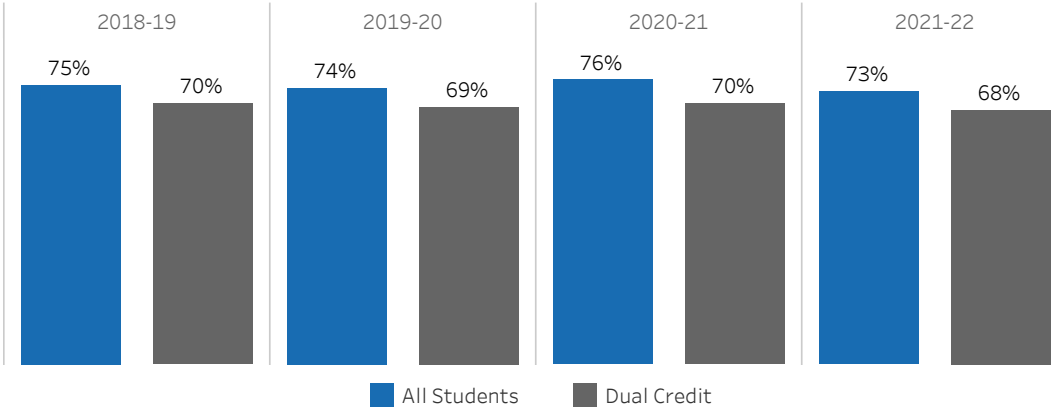

TOPIC: Non-represented Employee FY 2021-2022 Wage Increases – Work Study & Student Employee

POLICY 1.5 – Compensation and Benefits – With respect to employment, compensation and benefits to employees, consultants and contract workers, the Chief Executive Officer may not cause or allow jeopardy to fiscal integrity or public image.

Accordingly, he or she may not:

1. Promise or imply permanent or guaranteed employment.
2. Establish current compensation and benefits which deviate materially from the geographic or professional market for the skills employed or that may harm our competitive position.
3. Fail to ensure employee staffing profile efforts similar to the community profile.

Wisconsin Statute 38.12(3) required the District Board to approve compensation of District employees.

INTERPRETATION: The Board must authorize salary, wage and benefit increases of non-represented employees.

DATA/RESULTS:

Board authorization is requested to implement August 14, 2021 wage increase for work study and student employees. The proposed changes are aligned with the 2021-2022 fiscal planning parameters to the Board and do not deviate materially from the geographical or professional market for the skills employed.

For work study and student employees, an increase for FY 2021-2022 is proposed as follows: Raise all wages by \$2.00 per hour based on market (increase rate from \$11.00 per hour to \$13.00 per hour; and \$12.00 per hour to \$14.00 per hour).

POLICY Community Benefit Statement 2
Employers have an available and skilled workforce.

DATA/RESULTS: Dental Therapists are considered mid-level providers who fill a role which falls between that of a dental hygienist and a dentist. Working under supervision of a dentist, Dental Therapists can safely evaluate dental disease, develop a treatment plan, and provide other services within their scope of practice with two to three years of academic and clinical training.¹ This program is designed to provide instruction for persons presently employed as Dental Hygienist who wish to continue their scope of practice through furthering their education.

Wisconsin is ranked 45th out of U.S. states for pediatric oral health care. With 64 of the state's 72 counties facing dental care shortages for patients of all ages, the situation is approaching crisis level.² The dental access problem in Wisconsin directly affects the health of children, those living in rural areas, the disabled and the elderly. The indirect effects are felt by employers, school districts, taxpayers and the health care system. Wisconsin residents lack access to dental care. Four out of 10 adults had at least one permanent tooth removed because of tooth decay or gum disease, with missing teeth more common among people with low incomes. One in three African-American, Latino or Asian children in third grade had untreated tooth decay, compared with one in six for white children.³

NTC's service area is rural and lacks adequate oral healthcare. The Wisconsin Office of Rural Health has designated 7 of NTC's 10 counties as Health Professional Shortage Areas for dental health care.⁴ This means dentists in NTC's area are currently sharing a caseload of over 28,000 additional patients than the average Wisconsin dentist. Studies have shown that rural communities lack access to oral health providers due to geographic isolation and workforce shortages, poor health literacy, and difficulty navigating the oral health system—all of which impact oral and general health.⁵

The College wishes to submit Dental Therapist Associate Degree Program Concept Review documents to the Wisconsin Technical College System Office for consideration as part of the WTCS Occupational Program Approval Process. By approving the submission of the program proposal, the College will continue to the next step in the process for developing this as a WTCS approved program.

NTC offering suicide prevention training

Along with increased awareness about mental health issues in our society, Northcentral Technical College (NTC) in Wausau is offering a training to help people know how to respond to a person who is contemplating suicide.

NTC will offer a free QPR training on Aug. 17 from 8 to 10 a.m.

Similar to how people are trained to respond by giving CPR when a person goes into cardiac arrest, QPR provides a process for how to respond to a person who is suicidal.

The QPR training program is designed to enhance the general awareness about suicide through public education.

“Whether a teen or elder adult, we can all become aware of the warning signs

of suicidal thoughts and learn three basic intervention skill that can avert the tragedy of suicide,” a press release from NTC stated.

The first step of QPR is “question.” Training attendees will learn how to see the signs of suicidal thoughts and to ask the important question, “Are you thinking about harming yourself?” and listen to the answer without bias or alarm.

The second step is “persuade.” Attendees will learn about offering the suicidal person hope and alternative solutions.

“Suicide itself is not the problem; it is a perceived only solution by a person in crisis to what they see as an insurmountable problem,” the press release stated.

The last step in QPR is “refer.” That involves having the knowledge of how and where to go to help the person get help.

The training will be in person at the NTC Wausau campus, 1000 W. Campus Drive, Wausau, WI 54401, at the Professional Development Conference Center (Center for Health Sciences). Breakfast will be provided.

This training is hosted by the Alcohol and Other Drugs Partnership and Prevent Suicide Marathon County, with the support of Advancing Behavioral Health Wisconsin.

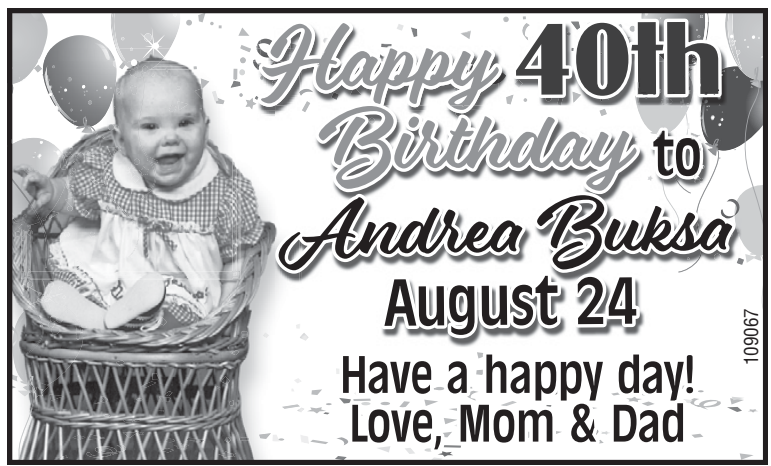

YOGA FOR BIKERS

‘Motorcycling Yogi’ plans to teach yoga moves at Bull Falls Harley-Davidson

He calls himself the “Motorcycling Yogi.”

The yogi Greg Ormson references is the kind who practices yoga, not the Hall-of-Fame catcher for the New York Yankees. The motorcycle he references is a sweet aqua-blue-and-white Harley-Davidson, a 2016 Road King, a bike with flowing art deco lines powered by a High Output Twin Cam 103 engine.

He’s not the only biker to discover that yoga enhances his motorcycling experience on the road, but he just might be the biggest advocate for blending the two passions.

He has written about it extensively in publications read by bikers and yoga practitioners. And Ormson, 66, regularly teaches yoga classes at the Harley-Davidson dealer in the Phoenix, Ariz., area where he lives.

Now the former Wausau resident brings his passion north. He will teach a session of his Yoga For Bikers class from 10 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Saturday at the Bull Falls Harley-Davidson store, 1570 Mara-

thon County XX, Rothschild. The class is free, but preregistration is required; people can register by calling Bull Falls at 715-355-4464. Participants will also need to fill out registration forms at <https://bullfallshd.com/Yoga-for-Bikers>.

You are forgiven if you make the assumption that there is a very slim overlap on a Venn diagram of the communities of Harley riders and the yoga practitioners. After all, the stereotypical profiles of each does not suggest shared interests. Think Harley biker, you’re likely to get a generalized vision of a burly dude in leathers. Think yoga, and you’re likely picturing a slim, flexible woman.

A manager at the Superstition Harley-Davidson store shared those visions when Ormson first approached her with the idea of teaching a class at the Arizona dealership.

“You know I’m going to eat some s--- from these guys,” she told Ormson, he said, “But I’m going to try it.”

What Ormson found is that people are lot more interesting than surface-level cliches, and once he started teaching the classes, he found a receptive au-

dience.

“A lot of people have come up to me and said, ‘I wish I knew about this years ago,’” he said.

It took a while for Ormson himself to put together yoga and biking.

He bought his first motorcycle, also a Road King Harley, in 2000, when he was living in Wausau and working as an English instructor at [Northcentral Technical College](#). He had wanted a motorcycle since he was teenager, “but my parents wouldn’t let me get one,” Ormson said. “They said I was too reckless, and they were right.”

The yoga came later. Ormson retired from [Northcentral Technical College](#) in 2012 and moved to Hawaii. The move wrecked his back and he found himself lying face up on a floor, thinking something has to change.

He first learned about yoga years ago while on a trip to India. In Hawaii, he decided to try it; there were yoga studios everywhere. He found that he loved it, and not only became a diehard practitioner, but took courses to become a yoga instructor.

Still it took an incident on the road for him to realize the power of yoga and how it can help a motorcyclist. He was driving down on a busy street in Hawaii. It was by a school, and children were running around. The roadway was littered with mangos, a common occur-

rence in the tropics.

Ormson said he had to do a U-turn, one of the more difficult maneuvers on a heavy motorcycle. For many riders, it’s a stressful turn. But he managed the turn-around, with his significant other riding on the back of his bike, with grace and aplomb.

“I thought, ‘Wow, why was that so easy?’” Ormson said.

As Ormson reflected on the situation, he thought about how calm he was. Yoga can help a biker by improving balance, strength and coordination, but Ormson said he thinks the most important part about the practice for a motorcyclist is the way it enhances “improved levels of calm and ease on the bike,” he said. “The awareness levels are really important, and with yoga, you kind of come into your attention, to be really present at the moment.”

That attention and presence, Ormson said, can not only enhance a ride, it could potentially be life-saving. That’s why he’s kept up his own yoga practice, carrying it with him with him when he moved to Arizona. That’s why Ormson has been doing all he can to share the benefits of yoga with everyone who will listen.

Wausau entrepreneur marks 1-year anniversary of custom sticker business

WAUSAU — "Choose joy." "But first, coffee." "Bee kind" alongside a sketch of the black-and-yellow striped insect.

A display box at Midwest-themed specialty gift shop The Local in Weston, 3806 Schofield Ave., holds over a dozen stickers adorned with inspirational quotes, interesting quips and handmade drawings.

The stickers, sketched and created on an iPad by Wausau-based sticker company Molly Lew Stickers, are the brainchild of local 21-year-old Molly Lewandowski.

"One night, I just sat down and made a Facebook page and said, 'Well, I guess I'm doing this,'" Lewandowski said. "No 'this is your day to take the leap of faith' — I just kinda did it."

Lewandowski, a 2018 graduate of Wausau West High School and current [Northcentral Technical College](#) small business entrepreneurship student, created her sticker company in mid-August 2020 after extended free time during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Lewandowski works alongside mom, Stephanie, who is the business director at the Car-

The stickers vary in price from \$3 to \$6. They are weather-resistant, dishwasher-safe, liquid-proof and printed by an Illinois-based print shop.

A wider array of stickers are available at The Local's Weston Marketplace location and the shop's downtown Wausau stop, 420 N. Third Street.

"We love having Molly in our shop — her products are amazing and we are so grateful to have her be a part of our local family!" said Alison Magnuson, owner of The Local. "Molly's entrepreneurial spirit is the embodiment of the maker movement."

The stickers are also available at locations throughout the state: in Barron County's Cumberland-based home

Some of Lewandowski's designs include a hand-drawn recreation inspired by the classic Wisconsin license plate design featuring the famous red barn, a blood orange sun and green bluffs; a sketched outline of the shape of Wisconsin with the words "cheese curds" placed inside; and "Up Nort" with an up arrow and a brown bear hugging a tree.

Each sticker has a matte finish, and most designs feature tonal colors — olive greens, oranges and creams, with Lewandowski's handwritten fonts.

"My inspiration comes from any-

thing around me," Lewandowski said.

Molly Lew Stickers celebrated its first anniversary in business Sunday. Lewandowski hopes to grow her business with dreams of opening a brick-and-mortar store and expanding the company's existing custom graphic design services.

NTC offering "Connect" program, allowing students to choose how to learn

WAUSAU, Wis. (WAOW) -- For the past couple of years, Northcentral Technical College has been piloting the NTC Connect program.

It gives students in certain degree areas flexibility on when and how they want to learn. Programs available through NTC Connect include digital marketing, early childhood education, leadership development, marketing and mechanical design.

Students enrolled in NTC Connect courses can choose the way they attend class on a week-by-week or even day-by-day basis. For example: they could go to class in person one day, then over Zoom the next, then work at their own pace the next.

"We have several different high definition cameras, some that track movement so that if the instructor is moving around lecturing, we can have the camera focus in on them," said Darren Ackley, Vice President for Learning.

Officials say there is some concern that students could fall behind through this method, but they say they work to ensure students stay engaged.

"In the past when we've done this, we've had instructors really recommend students that are maybe falling behind a little bit saying hey you really should come to class, if you can do everything you can to come to class we can get you caught up and get you back on track," Ackley said. Officials say they hope to expand the program to include more degree options.

QPR is a training program designed to enhance the general awareness about suicide through public education. Whether a teen or elder adult, we can all become aware of the warning signs of suicidal thoughts and learn three basic intervention skills that can help avert the tragedy of suicide.

- Question – Learn how to see the signs of suicidal thoughts and learning to ask the important question – “Are you thinking about killing yourself?” and listening to the answer without bias or alarm.
- Persuade – Offer the person hope and alternative solutions. Suicide itself is not the problem – it is a perceived only solution by a person in crisis to what they see as an insurmountable problem.
- Refer – Have the knowledge of how and where to go to help the person get help. “I want you to live, let me help you get help.”


This will be the first in-person AOD Partnership training since spring 2020. COVID-19 prevention measures are strongly encouraged.
