TOPIC: Tax Levy 2020-2021

POLICY 1.1 – General Executive Constraint – The Chief Executive Officer (CEO), in execution of her duties, shall not cause or allow any practice, activity, decision or organizational circumstance which is either imprudent or in violation of commonly accepted business and professional ethics or that results in failure to be accredited.

INTERPRETATION: To avoid violation of commonly accepted business and professional ethics NTC will follow §38.16 of the Wisconsin Statutes, "District Tax Levy; revenue limit; property tax relief aid. (1) Annually by October 31, or within 10 days after receipt of the equalized valuations from the department of revenue, whichever is later, the district board may levy a tax on the full value of the taxable property of the district for the purposes of making capital improvements, acquiring equipment, operating and maintaining the schools of the district, and paying principal and interest on valid bonds or notes now or hereafter outstanding as provided in s. 67.035." Under §38.16(3)(be) Wis. Stats., "no district board may increase its revenue in the 2014-15 school year or in any school year thereafter by a percentage that exceeds the district's valuation factor, except as provided in pars. (bg) and (br)." Under §38.16(3)(bg)(1) Wis. Stats., "[t]he limit otherwise applicable to a district board under this subsection is increased by an amount equal to the amount of any refunded or rescinded property taxes paid by the district board in the year of the levy as determined by the department under §74.41." For tax years beginning in 2019, §79.096 Wis. Stats. reduces the District's operational levy authority by "an amount equal to the property taxes levied on the items of personal property described under §70.111(27)(b) for the property tax assessments as of January 1, 2017." In May of each year, the Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR) shall certify payment to the District in an amount equal to the levy reduction and the Department of Administration (DOA) shall remit such payments to the District.

DATA/RESULTS: The District Board sets the official property mill rate for fiscal 2020-2021 at the October meeting based on the District's valuation factor as provided by the DOR in accordance with §38.16 Wis. Stats. In June 2020, the Board approved the 2020-2021 operating budget of \$50,212,071 with an operational mill rate of 0.63192. The Board approved a debt mill rate of 0.63817 and a total mill rate of 1.27009. The proposed mill rates are at or below the Board approved budgeted mill rates.

Equalized property valuations provided by the DOR for the NTC District increased by 5.29%, the total levy increased by 4.68%, with a total mill rate decrease of 0.58%. The District's valuation factor for Net New Construction is 1.60581%, providing for \$389,216 of additional Net New Construction tax levy revenue. Under §79.096 Wis. Stats., the District will remove \$74,750 for certain personal property value from the 2020-2021 operational levy, to be received directly from the DOA in May 2021.

Overall, the 2020-2021 District operational levy will increase by \$442,917 due to the Net New Construction increase of \$389,216, personal property tax aid reduction from prior year of \$37,264, and \$17,349 of refunded/rescinded property taxes. The District's 2020-2021 operational mill rate decreased from last year's 0.63192 to 0.62456 due to increased property valuations. The tax levy generates approximately 20% of the District's operating revenues. In addition to the annual levy, the District receives \$13,229,408 in State of Wisconsin Property Tax Relief Aid.

Purchases estimated to be over \$50,000 are competitively bid based on the WTCS Financial Accounting Manual Procurement requirements. The purchases on this list will be analyzed and competitive bids obtained if expenses warrant such during 2020-2021.

Many Changes, Same Focus

The challenges presented by COVID-19 caused us all to rethink and restructure how we serve students, requiring us to adjust quickly in order to ensure our students and staff were safe and had every opportunity to be successful.

At NTC, as with our K-12 schools, this meant moving most of our experiences to a virtual format. As we did so, it also gave us an opportunity to sharpen our focus, engage our flexibility, and be creative and responsive. To keep communication strong, NTC held our final School to Career Partnership Meeting virtually and began sending a weekly update email to our K-12 counselors and administrators. Knowing many students were in the process of finalizing their college choice, we developed virtual admissions sessions so students felt prepared to take important next steps. For those still in the exploration phase, we presented a virtual open house where students and parents could learn more about programs, engage with faculty and connect with staff about the many supportive services available at NTC. And, learning many trades-related dual credit classes could not finish the year without vital lab activities, we were able to safely open some of our spaces so students could complete their classes.

As we prepare this report, there is much uncertainty about the remainder of 2020. However, one thing that is crystal clear is that we look forward to partnering with you as we continue to be flexible, anticipate and respond to the needs of our community, and work together to serve our students.

The North Central Wisconsin School-to-Career Partnership meets quarterly, providing an opportunity for collaboration and information sharing. Each meeting includes sub-committee meetings for counselors and Youth Apprenticeship Coordinators. The partnership supports sharing of best practices and professional development.

In fall 2019, a group of NTC staff and K-12 counselors and teachers attended the National Career Pathways Network Conference to learn national best practices in developing and promoting career pathways in career and technical education.

In 2019-20, NTC supported staff in-services and local career fairs, developed new partnerships with area employers, and created new programs to engage students in career and college planning. Numerous grants support these initiatives. NTC provides dedicated funds for district high schools to expand and enhance awareness of career pathways.



OVER 170 HIGH SCHOOL DUAL CREDIT TEACHERS PARTICIPATED IN PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT WITH NTC FACULTY MENTORS IN 2019-20.

In June 2020, NTC welcomed 144 K-12 administrators, counselors, teachers, and other staff for our virtual Summer Institute – a day of training and professional development with sessions on maximizing engagement in a virtual learning environment, trauma, Zoom, ACP, and more. In addition, the following day, over 80 high school Dual Credit teachers participated in training with their NTC faculty mentors on curriculum and technology updates.



Funded with dollars from the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development Fast Forward grant, this training project will provide Master's level tuition reimbursement and professional development training for district dual credit teachers.

14 HIGH SCHOOL DUAL CREDIT TEACHERS

ENROLLED IN MASTER'S LEVEL COURSEWORK IN 2019-20

Higher Learning Commission (HLC) requires faculty who teach general education courses to hold a Master's Degree in that discipline, or any Master's Degree with a minimum of 18 graduate credits in the discipline being taught. Currently, NTC has worked with HLC to develop a "tested experience" qualification for faculty. Tested experience qualifications meet HLC requirements; however, increasing the number of high school instructors who meet the standard requirement through graduate credit completion strengthens outcomes for students.

Through spring 2021, NTC will provide tuition assistance for graduate credits to general education high school instructors teaching dual credit. In addition, NTC faculty mentors host high school dual credit teachers for professional development training throughout the year.

NTC and two partner high schools will benefit from the sharing of best practices, research, and advocacy as members of National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP). NACEP works to ensure that college courses offered by high school teachers are as rigorous as courses offered on the sponsoring college campus.


Youth Apprenticeship (YA)



CUSTOMIZED EXPERIENCES INTRODUCED IN 2019-20

Knowing that different groups of students have different needs and interests, we debuted an opportunity for teachers and counselors to request customized visits beginning in fall 2019. Through an easy-to-use form, a school representative could quickly tell us about the group they were bringing and what kind of experience they were looking for, and then our K-12 team worked together to ensure a meaningful experience that met the students where they're at.

Visiting groups varied from dual credit classes to middle school students looking to understand how the English skills they were learning in class would benefit them in college, students with disabilities, and juniors and seniors deciding on next steps after graduation. We were pleased to welcome over 700 students during 30 visits between September 2019 – February 2020 (the remainder of the spring visits were cancelled due to COVID-19).

As we approach fall 2020, we are once again pivoting to ensure student health and safety while still introducing them to the benefits of NTC. Look for more information from NTC's Event Coordinator and your career coach to learn how we can bring NTC to you in 2020!

National Science Foundation (EMMET) Grant

Northcentral Technical College organized the Central Wisconsin STEM Leadership Committee in the fall of 2019. Advocates for STEM Education from area business and industry, community based organizations, public education, and higher education have begun meeting quarterly to discuss the promotion of STEM education and develop a plan for how our region can collaborate on a variety of initiatives. This group provides a platform to be engaged in a mutually beneficial partnership in order to support each other's efforts.

MAKING SPACES

The Making Spaces Program is a national professional learning and capacity building program designed to support local leadership around maker education and build the foundation for lasting, embedded change in pedagogy, community, and culture. Alternative High School

Northcentral Technical College Alternative High School is a self-contained program where we provide educational services for those students who are at-risk of not graduating from a traditional high school setting and who would benefit from a more personalized program. Our school seeks to expand the classroom walls to include the community, so all students are involved in work and/or service learning opportunities. Combining school and work helps students draw connections between the academics being taught and the practical application of those skills.

Our school provides a unique atmosphere where we strive to meet students' academic, physical and emotional needs in addition to providing opportunities for team-building and enrichment. We pride ourselves on working closely with each student to build a strong foundation for their future through citizenship, life skills, and college and career transition. To this end, we have integrated a common focus throughout our school on LIFE: Literacy, Inspiration, Fundamentals, and Empowerment.

There are several academic options within our school that are geared toward finding the best pathway for each of our students to achieve a high school diploma:

CREDIT RECOVERY

This pathway is available to students who are at least sixteen years of age and who were not achieving success in the traditional high school setting. Students recover credits through attending core classes, and earn additional credits through employment, online courses, college academies, and other personalized opportunities.

HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY DIPLOMA (HSED)

This pathway is available to students who are at least seventeen years old and who meet the prerequisite of an appropriate reading proficiency. The HSED pathway offers a self-paced, competency-based option where students study to pass the four GED tests and complete four additional competencies: Health, Civics, Employability Skills and Career Readiness.

PROJECT-BASED

This pathway is available to students who are at least seventeen years old and who need an alternative competency-based program. Students complete a combination of core academic credits and community projects correlated to the 40 Developmental Assets, providing positive experiences and building qualities that influence young people's development, helping them become caring, responsible, and productive adults.

PRIDE ACADEMY

Above and beyond the individual pathways, our students also have the opportunity to participate in our college PRIDE Academy which expands on the elements of Productivity, Respect, Integrity, Dedication and Empathy. Students take the gateway course "Explore Your Path, Discover Your Future," a career exploration course meant to help them narrow down potential career interests and then work closely with NTC's Academy Specialist to identify additional free college courses they can take specific to their career and college plans.

As the founder and CEO of the I Believe Foundation, Nikkia decided to start important efforts to benefit at-risk youth because, as she states, "I know what it's like to be in their shoes." Nikkia has connected with Peyton's Promise to fill the Alternative High School's food and hygiene pantries, held a fundraiser at Thrive Church to provide Christmas presents to all Alternative High School students and has now created the I Believe Foundation Scholarship.

According to Nikkia, "When first starting at the Alternative High School, my only objective was to graduate high school. I never put any thought into my future or even college for that matter. I truthfully was more concerned about how I was going to survive my day to day life. When graduation came, I received a scholarship from the President of NTC (Dr. Lori Weyers) and that gave me an overwhelming feeling of gratitude and importance. That is what I want to give to more students. The "I Believe Foundation" is about giving a sense of hope and inspiration to students even if it seems impossible with their circumstances in their personal life."

In the near future, the I Believe Foundation plans to open a youth life skills center offering a safe place for teens to hang out while giving them access to mentorship, advocacy and resources in the community to meet their specific needs. This center will work hard to bring the resources to the student, and to provide the academic, physical, and emotional support a student needs.





Transfer Partnership Highlights

TRANSFERRING BEYOND NTC

Students can complete their associate degree at NTC and have opportunities to transfer their credits to a bachelor degree program with junior status. NTC has focused on 2 + 2 articulation agreements with regionally accredited four-year partner institutions that offer flexibility in class delivery options, affordable tuition, and a record of high graduation and employment.

NTC's advising and transfer teams assist students in determining where to complete their bachelor degree, review college transfer guides and help students choose additional courses that can be completed at NTC, and help to connect students to the transfer staff at their preferred four-year institution.

An agreement with Purdue University Global supports the theme of "no credit left behind." Students in any associate degree at NTC can transfer up to 86 credits to complete a bachelor's degree. Students completing an undergraduate degree will receive a 20% tuition reduction.

NEW: LIBERAL ARTS TRANSFER PROGRAM WITH MADISON COLLEGE

In March 2020, NTC entered into a new transfer partnership with Madison College which will benefit students who wish to earn an associate in arts (AA) or associate in science (AS) degree and/or who intend to transfer to a four-year university. The program provides students with an excellent foundation for continuing in higher education.

By completing the Liberal Arts Transfer degree at NTC in partnership with Madison College, students will typically satisfy the first two years of general education requirements for four-year colleges and universities and obtain an educational foundation in a breadth of disciplines. Pre-major disciplines include arts and humanities, economics and pre-business, pre-professional health and science, math and technology.



"One of the biggest benefits of the Liberal Arts Transfer agreement between Madison College and Northcentral Technical College (NTC) is the opportunities it opens up for students in north central Wisconsin. With

this program, students are able to take general education courses at NTC that can transfer to a four-year college or university. This will allow students who may not have had the option of relocating to a four-year college or university to start their four-year degree at NTC, all while saving money and staying closer to home."

TECHNOLOGY EDUCATION

NTC has partnered with Marian University to offer a unique opportunity for students to enroll in one of nine associate degrees in the NTC School of Applied Technology and Engineering or School of Advanced Manufacturing and Transportation and finish their bachelor's degree to earn a teaching license in Technology Education. NTC students receive a 10% tuition reduction with Marian and can complete their field experience/practicums in the NTC district.

NURSING

Nursing students can save time and money continuing their education with one of our many partner colleges. NTC has articulation agreements with 25 colleges for students to complete their BSN degree, many of which can be completed online.

ENGINEERING

An agreement with Michigan Technological University (MTU) allows students who meet NTC's associate degree requirements and additional criteria in Architectural Design, Electromechanical, and Mechanical Design Technology as well as IT-Networking and Video Production programs to transfer into a Bachelor of Science program. MTU offers a scholarship to eligible students through this agreement that equals the difference between non-resident and resident tuition, saving students thousands of dollars.

An agreement with Northern Michigan University (NMU) allows eligible NTC Electromechanical Engineering Technology graduates a new pathway to earn their bachelor's degree in Electrical Engineering Technology while remaining at the NTC campus. Students receive junior status but can take additional courses at NTC while completing their associate degree to transfer up to 90 credits.

Local salon teams up with cosmetology school to make haircuts available to all

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WAUSAU, Wis. (WSAW) - If you want to change the world, start in your own backyard. A hair salon in Weston is doing just that. They realized the Black community and those with curly or textured hair in the area travel just to get a haircut.

Now they're making sure the next generation of Wausau stylists can cut properly, no matter who sits in their chair.

Michael Linwood might be the first hair stylist in Wausau who can cut Black hair, but he'll cut anyone who wants a fade.

"You get to be creative, use your hands, make people feel good about themselves," says Michael Linwood.

After seeing many Black people travel hours away from Wausau for a decent cut, Verve Salon owner Marie Kieffer decided to make a change.

"It was just time that I had power and I had time to make a change," Kieffer says.

She brought on Linwood part time from Appleton, where he is the owner of Taperz Barber Shop. She had him teach several workshops about cutting textured hair over the summer, and says his good attitude and skill set fit well with her team.

"Our goal is for everyone in our community to feel comfortable and welcome in our space and know that they can get a service, depending on whatever texture you have," says Kieffer.

Now, Verve is grooming the next generation of Wausau hairdressers to cut everyone.

"Cutting black people's hair is not taught in the schools around here," says Linwood.

"It's systemic. It just started way back when, and it's just continued. I don't think we even realized it was happening," Kieffer says.

They're planning to work with Northcentral Technical College's Studio Max cosmetology students.

"That specialty will create a niche for them and they'll be able to service that population, and thus creating a multiplication factor so that we just start seeing it in more and more salons," says NTC Cosmetology faculty member Scott Staples.

Instruction in cutting textured hair will begin by November. Staples says it's a matter of making cosmetology school equal, in having students cut Black, white curly and straight hair, but also changing salons in central Wisconsin.

"I think we have a strong responsibility to have the best graduates that are going to go out into the workplace," he says.

Linwood says it's about more than just a haircut.

"A good haircut is confidence-boosting, and it just helps you feel good about yourself," he said.

NTC Cosmetology stays in-person, precautions in place

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WAUSAU, Wis. (WSAW) - Cosmetology is as hands-on as a class can get, and that can be difficult in times of a pandemic. Northcentral Technical College is making it work inside the classroom to keep students safe and educated.

"We're really getting into the meat of the chemistry because that's going to follow them the length of their careers," Scott Staples, Cosmetology faculty member at NTC, said.

Normally you would imagine students in this field to be in a salon setting, styling guest's hair and working on their craft. But for right now, they are learning the chemistry behind the hair they are styling. Even if shampooing hair isn't happening just yet, their work in the lab is still hands-on.

"In the lab is certainly the consideration of goggles and facemasks," Staples explained.

NTC has had to be creative with how students can operate in an environment where the risk of COVID-19 transmission is still prevalent.

"It's just giving gentle reminders that we do need to be mindful of COVID and the presence of this in our classroom," Staples said.

Not only are masks required, but safety glasses are also required in a classroom where students have to be up-close and next to each other.

"It's definitely tough with all of the extra protocols that we've been having to use with the masks and safety glasses," Lily Thao, a cosmetology student at NTC, said.

"It kind of gets in the way. If it falls down in the middle of a haircut, you've got to stop. Then re-sanitize your hands and then wash them," added student Katelin Herring.

Classes will soon move next door to the salon portion of the classroom.

"We're going to practice social distancing, out with the stations on the current floor. That we have that 6-foot distance. Masks will be required," Staples said.

Live models, composed of only volunteer NTC staff, will come in to give the students experience. No guest haircuts will be allowed.

"It's very unconventional for anybody but this is what we're faced with in a salon," Staples said.

"We've been able to experience that hands-on, which actually helps us learn a lot faster. It actually helps us retain more information," Jerry Jones, another student, said about he experience.
